The Execution of John Brown, and What Some Prominent Politicians Thought of It-Letters from an Ex-Governor, and an Ex-Mayor of New York—the Answer of Hen ry A. Wise.

The following letters would, in any case have possessed a strong political interest Under the circumstances of the fierce struggle through which we have passed, and the terrible bloodshed which has anew baptised the nation to life, they acquire additional importance. They were written some six years siuce.

LETTER PROM PRESIDENT BUCHANAN TO GOV.

WISE.

(Private.) WASHINGTON, 10th November, 1859. My DEAR SIR: On yesterday afternoon a gentleman called to see me and presented his card, of which the following is a copy : "Col James Patton, patentee of Patton's self-valancing cash raiser and look combined, post office 651, Troy, N. Yerk. Resider ce, 32 Seventh street, Trey, N.Y." He came with another gentleman. They remained a few minutes during the hour of reception, and went away After no left he returned and said he felt it his duty to make an important communication. and I told him to speak on. He said he knew a company of men had been formed in Troy to rescue John Brown, and he had no doubt they would make the attempt. I cross examined him closely; but he could give no satisfactory information on the subject-but still expressed his conviction that such a company existed. I did not regard it of any consequence at the moment, nor do I now look upon it in a different light. Sill, upon reflection, I deemed it best to state the circumstance to you. If it should do no good, it can certainly do no harm. I have no doubt your active vigilance will prevent the danger of any rescue. Yours very respectfully,

LETTER FROM FERNANDO WOOD TO GOVERNOR WISE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2, 1859. My DEAR SIR-Read this letter over carefully, and wnether concurring or not in its view, believe it emanates from your friend, and a man who has a thorough knowledge of the pulse of the people of the free States. Your proceedings and conduct thus far in

the matter of the conspiracy at Harper's Ferry, meets with general approval, and elicits commendations from your enemies.

The firmness and moderation which has characterized your course cannot be too highly applauded, and to-day you stand higher than any other man in the Union. Now, my friend, dare you do a bold thing and "temper justice with mercy ?' Have you nerve enough to send Brown to the State prison for life instead of hanging him? Or, rather, I should ask whether such a course would be consistent with your own sense of duty, for I know that that is the sole controller of your official conduct. Brown is looked upon here as the mere crazy or fool-hardy emissary of other men. Circumstances create a sympathy for him even with the most ultra triends of the South. I am of this latter class, as by recent speeches you may have observed. No Southern man could go further than myself in behalf of Southern rights, but yet, were I the Governor of Vagania, Brown should not be hung, though Seward should be if I could catch him; and in such a course my conduct should be governed by sound policy. The South will gain by showing that it can be magnanimous to a fanatic in its power. We who fight its battles can gain largely by pointing to such an instance of "chivalry" You can judge of Southern sentiment better than myself; I can judge of Northern sentiment better than you. It the South will sustain such an act, the whole

North will rise en masse to applaud it. I have thus briefly and frankly discharged my duty as your friend, to give advice under trying circumstauces.

ANSWER OF GOV. WISE TO FERNANDO WOOD. RICHMOND, Nov. 4, 1859.

My DEAR SIE:-I have received and weighed every word of your letter. I gave it all credit for good motive and good morals and as suggesting what, perhaps, is good

Policy.

Had I reached Harper's Ferry before these men were captured (and I would have reached there in time had I been forwarded as I ought to have been from Washington and the Relay House.) I would have proclaimed martial law, have stormed them it the quickest possible time, have given them no quarier, and if any had survived I would have tried and executed them under sentence of court-martial. But I was too late. Tue prisoners were captives, and I then deter mined to protect them to the uttermost of my power, and I did protect them with my own person. I escorted them to prison and placed around them such a force as to overawe Lynch law. Every comfort was given them by my orders. And they have been scrupulously afforded a fair and speedy t. ial with every opportunity of defence for crimes which were openly perpetrated before the eyes of hundreds, and as openly confessed.

They could escape conviction only by technical exceptions, and the chances for these they had to a greater degree by the expedition of prosecution. And the crimes deliberately done by them are of the deepest and darkest kind which can be committed against our people. Brown, the chief leader, has been legally and fairly tried and convicted and admits the humanity of his treatment as a prisoner, the truth of the indictment, and the truthfulness of the witnesses against him. He has been allowed excess of counsel, and the freedom of speech beyond any priso er known to me in our trials. It was impossible not to convict him. He is sentenced to be hung that is the sentence of a mild code, humaren adjudged, and requires no only from me except to see that it is executed. I have to sign no death warrant It the Executive interposes at all, it is to pardon; and to pardon him I have received petitions, prayers, threats from almost every free State in the Union. From honest, patriotic men like your self, by many of them I am warned that hanging will make him a martyr. Ah! Will it? Way? The obvious answer to that question shows me above anything the necessity for hanging him. You ask:—" Have you nerve enough to send Brown to the State Prison for life instead of hanging him?" Yes, if I didn't think he ought to be hung, and that would be inexcusable for mitigating his pun-ishment, I could do it without flinching, without a quiver of muscle against a universal clamor for his lite. But was it ever known before that it would be impolitic for a State to execute her laws against the high-est crimes, without bringing down upon herself the vengeance of a public sentiment out-side of her limits, and hostile to laws? Is it

better spare a murderer, a robber, a traitor, because public sentiment elsewhere will glorify an insurrectionist with martyrdom? if so, it is time to do execution upon him and all ike him. And I therefore say to you, firmly, that I have precisely the nerve enough to let him be executed with the certainty of his condemnation. He shall be executed as the law sentences him, and his body shall be delivered over to the surgeons, and await the resurrection without a grave in our soil. have shown him all the mercy which human ity can claim. THE NEWS.

The famous Confederate ram Stonewall, has crossed the ocean, and arrived at Nassau, New Providence, where she put in for coals and repairs. On her passage from Teneriffe, which she made in six days, she captured a Baltimore vessel, and released her on bonds. A Charleston despatch of the 8th inst. states that Admiral Dahlgren has made such disposition of the vessels of his squadron all along the coast from Georgetown, S. C., to Key West, Fla., as to render them fully prepared for the Stonewall should she make her appearance.

The testimony for the accused in the Harris case was concluded at Washington the 12th. The court finally decided to admit a copy of the rolls in evidence. These rolls do not contain the names of the two persons who gave testimony against Mr. Harris. The accused proceeded to read his defence, after which the court forwarded their judgment to the Judge Advocate General and adjourned sine die. The decision will probably appear

The pretended trial of the assassination conspirators in Washington is proceeding; but the reporters for the press are still excluded from its sessions, and therefore little regarding it can be learned. It is rumored, however, that the authorities will soon permit certain portions of the evidence to be daily made public. Several of the accused have succeeded in securing counsel.

Much excitement exists in Indianapolis and other points with reference to the approaching execution of the three so-called "Sons of Liberty," or " Knights of the Golden Circle," sentenced to death by a military commission. It is said they were promised by President Lincoln a commutation of seutence

In the case of Mrs. Bessie Perrine, of Baltimore, on trial before a court manual in Washington, charged with giving valuation information and aid to the rebels duri: the occasion of Early's raid around Washington and Baltimore, the evidence for the defence was yesterday concluded.

Mr. George N. Sanders has appeared in print. He says that the proclamation about the assassination is mendacious and pernicious, and the testimony is founded on forged papers and suborned witnesses. He has sent to Europe his account of the matter.

The occupation of Augusta, Georgia, by portion of General Wilson's national cavalry force, is reported by the Savannah Herald of the 8th iust. River communication between Savannah and the interior towns of Georgia nas been reopened under national auspices.

The land slide at A giers, opposite Now Orleans, is increasing and doing much damage. The country near Baton Rouge is inundated.

A convention is to meet at Vicksburg on the 5th of June to make a movement toward the restoration of Mississippi.

Gen. Grant expects momentarily to hear of the surrender of Kirby Smith on the same terms as those accorded Lee, Johnston, and Taylor.

There is another flood at Albany, caused by the heavy rains on Wednesday and Thursday.

The tornado, of Thursday evening last visited Bethel pretty roughly. The steeple of the Congregational Church, at Bethel, was thrown down through the roof, making a complete wreck of the building; loss about \$5,000. The roof of the residence of Wm. A. Judd, at Bethel, was also torn off and the house and furniture damaged. Trees barns, vines, &c., suffered severely.

Surrattsville, Md., by orders from Washington, is henceforth to be called Robeysville, possibly with the idea that all memory of the Presidential tragedy connected with the name of Surratt, may be obliterated. MATTERS OF LOCAL INTEREST. THE TRIAL OF THE ASSASSINS.

Some of the administration as well as all o the opposition journals do not approve of the secret trial of the assassins-the star-chambor proceedings against the supposed accomplices of Booth in his "foul and most unnatural murder." No one, whether connected with the press, or otherwise, seems to know anything of the proceedings now going forward in Washington. Men and women (how many who can tell ?) charged with the greatest orimes, are now undergoing some sort of an examination-trial it certainly cannot be cailed-somewhere, before a military tribunal convened in secret. Possibly the supposed criminals may have counsel, a fair and impartial hearing-who knows? We do not seek to apolegize for or in any way palliate their great crimes-but it seems to us justice might be done openly, in the light of day, with nothing concealed, none of this mystery, this secrecy, so repugnant to the minds of Americans. Such a course as that now pursued cannot be productive of goodit will lead to suspicion, doubt, sympathy, in the popular opinion. The New York Times (Abolition) in considering this matter, says : We think it would have been infinitely better o have postponed the trial till all publicity could do no harm, even if that period were likely to be x months distant, than introduce into this counry so novel a tribunal, and one so repugnant to the spirit of our institutions, as that which is now sitting at Washington. It is one for which no precedent is to be found in the history of any free ountry, and one to which the worst European despotisms have rarely ventured, even in Poland or Hungary, to resort. Even the unhappy victims of the Irish rebellion were prepared for the gallows n open court, and in the light of day.

The New Haven Journal, as might have been expected, rebukes the Tribune and Times, and sees no occasion for alarm in those secret military tribunals, classifying those Republican journal which do in the same category with Copperheads-and asserts that the considerations so "strenuously urged by them are singularly weak and empty." The Journal is very, very wise-in its own con-

In the course of a splendid article on the subject, the World, of May 12th uses the following strong but just expressions of indignation:

What the excuse is for conducting these trials by a military commission, we neither know nor can conceive; but it is given out that the Star Chamber is adopted to prevent witnesses learning from the newspapers what other witnesses testify. If the principle is sound, the Star Chamber should be the universal model of courts of justice. It is true that secret trials afford some additional facilities for detecang talse swearing; but this is so small an advantage in comparison with the outrageous evils of the system, that it is justly regarded as odious in all free countries. The argument is, that any method is justifiable that unlocks the minds of witnesses and gets at the truth But this argument proves too much. It no more jusufies the Star Chamber than it justifies the thumbscrews and the rack as the means of extorting evidence and getting at the truth. This general question was well touched on by Macaulay in his speech in Parliament, in 1844, reprobating the violation of the mails by S.r James Graham as a means of obtaining evidence. We copy a short extract :

"There could be no doubt there might be an advantage in breaking open letters. No one de nied it; but then was it fitting that it should be done? In the same way, did any one doubt that there was an advantage in having police spies But then the country did not approve of them The French had an advantage in having police spies. No one doubted the spy system enabled them to bring to justice many who must otherwise have escaped. It was the same thing as to tor-ture. There could be no doubt that as long as the Euglish law sanctioned the use of torture a great many crimes were detected by it. It had, too, its advantages. Yes; for the instant that Guy Fawkes was shown the rack, out came at once the entire story of the gunpowder plot. Even this tor ture, as well as the spy system, had these advan-tages, but then this country had determined. long ago, that such advantages were pernicious, debasing, and dangerous modes of maintaining its in stitutions. Their ancestors declared that they would rather take the risk of great crimes being committed, than owe their security to that system, or those means, which would destroy the manly spirit of the people, on which far more reliance could be placed than on all the schemes and decrees that could be invented for maintaining their

greatness and independence as a nation.

And what guarantee have we that torture has not been practiced by the tools and underlings of Stanton? Every other method known to des ous has been practiced and improved upon by him; why should he stick at this? Torture was never practiced in public : and we apprehend that anyondy who coulunfold the secrets of Santon's prison-houses might a tale unfold which would make the hair of humane men stand on end with hor ror. The mangling and mysterious disposal of the body of Booth discloses a taste like that of the old despots who quartered and disemboweled criminals after execution; a kind of treatment which the framers of the Constitution intended to guard against in the declaration that unusual punishments shall not be inflicted. Sanion has rifled mails; he has maintained an army of spies; he has insulted the tribunals of justice; he has established a S:ar Chamber; he has done evey odious and abominable thing known to the history of tyranny; and what assurance have we that he has not also practiced torture? The argument offered for his Star Chamber would equally justify torture as a means of extorting evidence; and who ever suspected Stanton of scrupling to carry out a tyrannical principle?"

### GOLD DOWN, I ROVISIONS UP.

It is a matter of much surprise to people who have to eat and drink, and clothe them selves, that the prices of provisions, coffee tea, beef, cloths, muslins, linens, &c., still remain the same as when gold ranged from 250 to 285. Then, dealers informed the public consumers of articles which they offered for sale, that the high premium on gold influenced the prices of everything else, but new, when gold is at 129, and still falling, they claim that it has nothing to do with the markets. This is a gross imposition and fraud. There is no good reason why meats and groceries generally should bring almost the same prices realized six months or a year ago. It is a piece of extortion.

It is supposed that Gov. Pierpoint of Virginia will issue a proclamation at an early State and ordering a new election.

The limitation, according to the rules agreed upon, expires on the 18th inst., and Mr. Hewies being unable to appear at that time, he loses his chance to play under his challenge, and the next challenge in order takes precedence. This is from Ralph Benjamin of this city. who will doubtless play for the championship and cue some time in August. Much as we should regret depriving the gentlemanly and agreeable champion of the emblem he has so valiantly held, it looks to us, Gershum, as though that cue was to come to our city this time, sure. We feel certain that a strict examination of it would reveal the fact that Bridgeport" was engraved on it. Hartford is not the place for such an article,-it is altogether too secluded a village for the residence of the champion of the State.

"CAN'T AFFORD TO LIME."

This was the answer which I received from

neighbor, when I asked him why he did not put on lime. "Can't afford it." What! can't you afford to make your fields produce one third more grain and grass than

they have been doing? It costs money, but what is the use of monbut to lay it out in such a way as to proluce more, in the same way that we sow wheat or plant corn, in order to get more

wheat or corn in return. The true plan of using money is to invest it so as to make it as productive as possible; and there is no way which I know of by which a farmer can make his funds increase faster

than by applying them to increase the fertility of his farm. That good old farmer, Jethro Tull, admon-

ished his neighbors to "be kind to their land," well knowing, from his own experience, that the result would be prosperity. But those who go on skinning and impoverishing their land, act the part of the old woman who killed the goose that laid the golden eggs. They soon arrive at that state in which they 'can't afford to lime."

I know an old grey-headed farmer who humble as was his commencement in life could always afford to lime, because he knew that if he enriched his soil, it in return would enrich him. And in this way they have been going on for half a century conferring reciprocal benefits on each other, and it is now a question not so easy to determine which is the richer he or his farm. He alway could afford to lime.

Those who think they cannot afford to lime much, should lime a little; make a beginning, for there is nothing like commenceng to do right.

Buy lime enough to lime ten acres, even if you borrow money to pay for it, and the increase will pay for the time and enough more to lime ten acres additional, and so on; budon't say, "you can't afford to lime."—A Working Farmer in Germantoun Telegraph.

How to PLOW CORN GROUND -We com-

mend to our reader a practice which we have followed with great satisfaction in plowing corn ground, whether it was sod or scubble namely : by what is called "back furrowing -commencing in the middle of the field, turning the furrows inward, thus plowing the entire field "geeing round." Find the middle of a field with a measuring pole or tape and set a stake. Then turn a ridge of two furrows in a straight line from each corner of the field to the stake. These ridges will enable a plow man to do his work well at the turning points. The advantages of plowing in this manner are, there will be no dead furrows in the neld. A row of corn, if planted in a dead furrow will not amount to much, except for fodder. When a field is plowed in lands, the soil will not be thorougly broken up beneath the ridges. When a field is plowed by going round the outside and finishing in the middle, there will be a dead furrow from each corner to the middle of it. The team, moreover must turn on the plowed ground, which treads scribing the Old Penitentiary buildings, in down a wide strip from the corners to the which the conspirators are confined: A large middle of the field. But when plowed by beginning in the middle, the entire teau, whether double or single, always turns on the unplowed ground, and it is easier for the plowman to turn out and set in his plow at the corners, than when he turns the furrow outward. By plowing in this way, the surface will be kept level, and the work performed in a more workmanlike manner. In order to have every side of the field finished like, measure each side from the plowed ground to the outside of the field every day. Then the furrows may be varied in width, or omitted on one side, while the plowed plot is small. Aim always to keep the furrow slices of a uniform width .- American Agriquiturist.






