When I sow new seed I never fail to have my land well seeded. But when the seed was more than one Boots and Shoes, year old I have always observed that the land was very thinly seeded, and some times not seeded at all.

It is always my aim to raise my own grass seed of every kind, and especially my own timothy seed; and never to sow that which is more than one year old But for a number of years past, some insects have so injured our timothy grass, that it will not yeild a sufficient quantity of seed per acre, to pay for the expense of gathering it, making no account of the loss incurred for hay, by allowing it to remain uncut until the seed had matur-Clover and Timothy Seed, ed. In consequence of this, I have been obliged to purchase my timothy seed wherever it could be found, running the risk of getting fresh seed.

In the spring of 1858, I purchased tim-o hy seed which was brought from lllinoss East Hadd to seed six acres, and a part with oats, the whole ground having been summer fallowed the season previous; and consequently was in fine condition for seeding with anything. I sowed at the rate of one peck of timothy, mixed with about ten pounds of clover seed to the acre. To my great disappointment not a single seed vegetated, and very little clover, as that had been kept over one season: and now the field must necessarily be plowed and again seeded. 
