This measure removes the licensing of records from those persons authorized to kill deer through the entire year with rifle or shot gun without regard for the number of deer killed. Section 2 increases from 2 to 5 the number os permits the landowner may authorize the privilege of hunting deer with a short gun during the month of December, while the number of such permits that any individnal may obtain is reduces to 5 to 3.

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This measure provides for greater participation in deer hunting in non-land owning sportsman with final control vested in the landowner.

THE CHAIR:

Mr. President, in the event of any future questions on this matter, may I request that the following remarks be read into the record and said remarks be part of the proceedings. Mr. President, with the technological advances being made in containers for milk for human consumption, plastics or polymeric materials are receiving increased interest and usage. Some manufacturers provide single service or throw-away plastic bottles, while others are producing reusable bottles. It is with these plastic or polymeric reusable containers that we focus our attention. This bill is intended to insure the reusable bottles do not contain poisonous or deleterious materials which would contaminate the milk and endanger the health of the consumer.

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Chlorinated hydrocarbons such as gasoline, kerosine and paint thinners have been found by scientific testing, conducted in this state as well as by agencies of the Federal Government, to be absorbed into the molecular structure of the plastic material and thereafter reabsorbed into the milk. Science as yet has been unable to discover any cleaning system or method which would remove these contaminants once they have been placed in a plastic container. Thus, the only way that we can insure the health and safety of the consumer is to require that some test be applied to the containers prior to their being refilled with milk to determine whether or not any contaminants are present.

Let us take an example of what could happen without the safeguard of this legislation. Containers of this nature are often used by the consumer for various home purposes. For instance, assume that a housewife fills the container with DDT to spray her garden or fills such a container with kerosine for housecleaning purposes. When her task is completed, she rinses the container and returns it to a store for the return of the deposit. The container is eventually refilled with milk and sold to a consumer. Since no method for removing the contaminants has been devised as yet, the consumer, whether a child or an adult, is then subject to illness from the contaminants in the milk. If this bill is passed, no such contaminated bottle will find its way back to the consumer.

This bill is therefore designed to provide that any milk

Page 29 April 15, 1969 dealers using the reusable plastic containers must have a device or method which will automatically test the presence of these contaminants in plastic or polymeric containers prior to their reuse. Most Connecticut milk dealers have already installed such a device, but it is vital to the public health of Connecticut that all dealers be required to employ some method to insure against reuse of a contaminated bottle. Legislation similar to this is now in effect in more than half the states of the Union. It is one of the fundamental duties of the legislator to provide for the health and safety of its people. The failure to pass this measure would be a serious neglect of that duty. I move for passage of this bill. THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. Senator Lyddy of the 22nd District. SENATOR LYDDY:

Mr. President, I concur this is a good bill. I did hear the word DDT. I think that we have the household filling these bottles with DDT. I have a bill which is presently being considered which will take one more step to eliminate the use of DDT from the state and I hope that we will have no DDT in plastic bottles or any other type bottles before too many more years. I think this is a good bill and it should pass.

THE CHAIR:

Mr. President, I am not even the acting Senate Minority Leader, but there doesn't seem to be anybody here at all today except peasants like myself. I'm going to vote for this bill its a silly bill. Its all part of a continuing process of hiding from all of us what we are. Its not only the case of Dog Warden

Page 46 April 15, 1969 the Dog Warden has a long and honorable history. It goes back into ancient history the name warden and dog. You couldn't get two more basic words that they go into the latin. Mr. President, and members of the circle. I rise to oppose the rejection of House Amendment Schedule, "A". I want to make it very clear that we, on the Minority side of the aisle, are very enthusiastically in favor of annual sessions. Our only difference with the Majority, is in the call of annual sessions and our objective is to find the most workable and the most direct and the most pheasable and the most uncluttered form of annual sessions. It's our view that this measure as passed by the house, providing for a regular five month session and a shorter session in the even numbered years without any restriction on the type of business that might be brought up is the better solution to this problem. Mr. President, I'd like to observe in passing that this debate doday in somewhat complicated by the fact that the House Amendment are not published in our file. To be sure, we have them on our desks as required by the rule but I'd like to observe that under Joint Rule 18 which provides that if the amendment is termed "technical", it need not be printed. That this indeed are the matters, a matter as important as this, as important as anuual sessions is truly an abuse of the quality to rule an amendment technical. Amendments have to be printed and referred back to the Legislative Commissioner's office unles, and I quote from the rule, this

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this rule shall not apply to amendments offered solely for the purpose of correcting clerical errors and mistakes in form or dates. These amendments made in the House, would seem to me go clearly beyond that part of the rules.

If I may be permitted to make a general observation of the context of this debate, Mr. President, I hope that the use of this ruling calling amendments, "technical", can be tightened up somewhat, in the future. I think that it restricts our debate somewhat and makes it more flifficult, it certainly makes it more difficult to understand and as we get further into the session and bills come along at a greater rate, I don't think it would make a substantial contribution to the public business, to have any of these things ruled, Technical".

Be that as it may, I wish to oppose the House Amendment, on the basis that to restrict the short session, to restrict the even numbered years session, to matters which are budgetary or revenue or financial is really, not only difficult but in fact in may prove to be unworkable.

How do we decide, for example, what is budgetary, revenue or financial? All this does is introduce one more subject or argument that I can see many countless hours of debate to be taken up with that often has little to do with the merits of the particular proposal, namely, a long prolonged argument of whether a bill is or is not revenue, financial or budgetary? An d therefore, arguing while it is properly before us. It

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seems to me, that it alos opens up the possibility of court appeal. It gives the people opposed to a measure that may have been passed by this legislature in the even numbered years, one more opportunity to fight the measure, one more chance to say that it wasn't properly before the legislature and therefore, could be struct down by the court.

I wonder, Mr. President and members of this circle, if we're not really kidding ourselves. I wonder if we're not really inviting subterfuge, by putting something like this in the resolution and therefore, in the Constitution. Take something like Probate refore, for instance. One can make a case, if this is budgetary, revenue or fifancial. There are filing fees. In the even numbers years would probate reform be properly before the legislature? Someone has even observed with a wry smile, a matter such as, liberalizing the abortion laws be brought Before the legislature in the even numbered years, providing a filing fee was attached to it. In fact, really, it's hard to think of any subject in which, it's not possible by amendment or by attaching a filing fee or some such condition it's hard to think of any measure that could, by some stretch, be brought before the legislature.

So I wonder, if this isn't subterfuge? I really question the wisdom of cluttering up our Constitution with a provision that maybe unworkable that may lead to court appeals, that may be completely unnecessary and may simply invite subterfuge. I

April 22, 1969 Page 13 would urge, Mr. President, and members of the circle, that this is a measure as passed in form, by the House, is in the best form and that the motion to reject this particular House Amendment be defeated by us here today. SENATOR BARRY:

Mr. President, I was going to reserve my remarks on the question of our limitation of our second session, to the point of which, the amendment will be before you, Senate Amendment Schedule, "A" which will be introduced. But I feel that if we are going to vote on it now, on the question of whether to inforse what the House has done or not to indorse it. We ought to, at least, get into some of the areas. Some of the arguments rose by the distinguished Minority Leader. And I will take serious issie, with him, when he sys how do we decide what is a budgetary fiscal revenue matter. And I would also take issue with him, when he talks about risk of excessive court appeals.

I want very briefly, at this point, to say that this matter has been thoroughly researched and I would like to read to you, what is the controlling law, as defining budgetary revenu and fiscal, so that this argument will be seen for what it is. In effect it is a subterfuge for the type of position that the Minority party is taking on this amendment. And I would refer you to the case of Ard versus the people, in '66 Colorado page 484 where the Court says, " a revenue measure is one which has for its object the leveling of taxes in the strict sense of the word. That the principle object is another purpose for in-

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incidental production of revenue growing out of the enforcement of the act will not make it one of raising of the revenue.

Now, certainly, the argument made by, Senator Barnes, the argument made by, some distinguished members of the House, that if the abortion law bill were to pass with a three dollar fee, that might be attached to it. that would then become a budgetary matter, certainly, doesn't hold weight, in the light of the prevailing legal opinion, in this courntry. And I can't find any evidence. of any recessive litigation throughout this State. Now, we have shix states which have limited sessions, limited for budgetary, limited to general welfare and other limited sessions, which we will go into later. And I don't know of more than two cases, in this country, that grew out of these limitations, and most states follow what is known as the principle purpose test and if the principle purpose is to raise taxes then it falls within that limitation. If it's to allow abortions then it does not. I think the issue is very clear. I think the people of thes State want to have an anuual session they want to have a budgetary session, they want to limit it and not let the flood gates open to all kinds of litigation. I would, therefore, move for rejection of House Amendment Schedule "a".

SENATOR MARCUS:

Mr. President, I rise to support the motion to reject the house amendment. Mr. President, the distinguished Minority

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Leader. I, myself, really find ourselves in the same side of the basic issue and that is, I think, we both, unequivically support the concept of annual sessions. I do think that Senator Barnes, however, in the two points that he made, to the circle, is in error. To begin with, it is very obvious that no one in this circle, has any control over any ruling made by the Speaker of the House, in his wisdom, anymore than the members of the House have any control over any ruling that the President of this body may make. I would agree, I think that it's unfortunate in this particular situation, that the House Amendments are not in the file. However, I also think that it's self-evident that this is one of the great issues of this session, this is one of the issues that we've all been living with and I think are fully conversant with. On the issue of rejection, itsOer, however, I think it should be made abundanly clear, that Senator Barry intends to introduce an amendment. An amendment which would propose that the second year cover not only fiscal matters but those matter raised by joint committee, those matters which the President Pro Temp and Speak would accord emergency certification. So that, infact, the example of an abortion bill, if we're going to use this as an example thing, which someone might contrive to bring before the legislature, if the session were restricted simply to fiscal matters. This type of desception would not be used, need not be used because the simple fact is that if the Joint Committee wish to

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faire raise a bill on abortion or any other subject matter it could. I think the obvious fact is that within a 90 day second year session, it would be almost impossible for this legislature to adequately think about and discuss and review and really dig into five or six thousand bills. And this really is what the issue is. The only issue before us today, in the minds of those who support annual sessions, is not an issue of House versus Senate. Not an issue of Majority Party versus Minority Party because I think that the vast bulk of us are married to the concept of annual sessions. The only issue is really what will be most productive for the people of this State, what can we oderly and properly take up in a second year session of 90 days, bearing in mind that Connecticut, if it does enact annual sessions, if the people do support it and I hope that they will, is truly embarking on a new concept for the State of Connecticut and a 90 day session certainly could not adequately handle the same kind of volume that we see on any year basis. SENATOR BUCKLEY:

Mr. President, I rise to support the House Amendment. I do this consciously rejecting the argument that this body cannot regulate the flow of its own business through rule changes. I accept the fact of responsibility. I accept the fact that I feel the people who sit around this circle and the people who sit in the House, downstairs, are mature and intelligent individuals, would not want a duplicate flow of bills such as those bills

Page 17 April 22, 1969 that rise in the first session presuming we do have annual sessions. And would be able to conduct their own affairs. It is interesting for me and in many circles in this building, to hear talk of responsibility as a legislature making it a coequal of the executive and then on the other hand saying, that we cannot regulate our own affairs by having an unlimited or open session. That we need some restrictions on certain bills that can be introduced and cannot be introduced therefore, denying the argument of the co-equal branch, the branch that those people who sit in this circle are part of. Question is on the motion to reject House Amendment Schedule

SENATOR HAMMER:

Mr. President, I have one practical suggestion to make and one question to ask. As far as I am concerned, I think it would be very foolish to put into our Constitution this limiting restriction on what we can take up in the second of two annual

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sessions. If we put it in the Constitution and then in one or two after one of two bienniums, we feel that we want to change this. then we have to go through the whole constitutional an endment process again. I wonder if it would be far better to put into the Constitution the fact that we intend to have annual sessions. make this change and then control the subject matter by statute? It seems to me, the more reasonable and practical way of doing things. The question that I want to ask, and I'm sure people will think it's immature, but it worries me, a great deal. If we reject the House Amendment and substitute one of our own then I see the possiblity of a stale-mate arising between the House and the Senate in a committee of conference. And then I see the hard possibility that the whole issue would go down the drain through this device of a stale-mate in a committee of conference. I wish some one would comment on that. SENATOR MARCUS: We alread of This our separation of Loron

Be rashing pell-mell to answer Senator Hammers' question. But to comment I think the very obvious fact is, that has never been the basis of any action taken by this body. Let's face and cross that bridge if and when it ever comes. SENATOR BARLOW:

Mr. President, I which to state at this time, to go on record, that I'm in favor of annual sessions, without any restriction. THE CHAIR:

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Question is on the rejection of <u>Schedule "A2</u> of <u>Resolution</u> <u>No. 160.</u> SENATOR HULL:

Mr. President, I rarely do belive this is a Republican Democratic issue. I wonder if there are two Democratic parties in this wonderful old building. for I will call to the attention of this group. that the vote in the House was that rarity of unanimous vote for the unrestricted second session. All of the Democrats and all of the Republicans and all of us Republicans up here, as far as I know, and I don't want to go out on a limb because we have many independent coats in our party, but so far as I know, all of our people are ready to go for unrestricted second session. So I do think that it's a political issue of the greatest magnitude that separates us. The question is, what are we afraid of? I've said this again and again up here, what are we afraid of? It's our Republican philosophy that that government which governs best which is closest to the poeple. And we also, dadly decry the rift toward federalism But the fundamental reason is one of Governor Rockerfeller pointed out town years ago, toward the rift toward federalism, is that the states, in the mal-apportioned, under paid and under staffed legislatures were only step-children in the State Government administration and the states were not equipped to do the job. So if we're going to follow through hopefully with some revenues sharing and some hope that the state, being closer to the people, will pick up some of the loaded government and

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pick up perhaps in the areas where it is particularly expert and apt to have a better answer have the State manage the problems instead of Uncle, so far away. WE've got to have a strong state government. And it's axiomatic that in order to have a strong state government we have to have a strong legislature. I don't expect to change anybody's mind here but this is my fourth term and I've always hoped I might change one, before I leave this chamber. So I'll carry on a little bonger.

The Eagleton Report, which Senator Marcus helped bring about, and I thank him, of it. has been of some benefit already. Urged unrestricted annual sessions whith these arguments, which are very well summarized in a remarkable study made by the Yale Legislative Services, Yale Law School, New Haven, Connecticut, signed by Eathon Gap- Katsh, Yale Law School 1970 and Frederick Taft, a wonderfule name in my circle, Yale Law School 1971. And I hope that the distinguished lawyer and Senator David Barry has read this, because this indicates a great deal more litigation than he had reported to us on the subject of what does or does not come withing the purview of a restricted annual session. Well, as they sum up, the recommendations of the Eagleton Report, they say this report included that unrestricted annual sessions would permit a. more time for the legislators to deliberate bills, I suppose you get tired of hearing us fellows in Judiciary talk about the load, but we have almost one out of five bills, just short of a thousand bills this session and as soon as I get

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through this debate, I'll have to rush back there and hope to get more bills out by 5 0'clock.

Obviously, when we have the other session, unrestricted. we'd have to have some rules changed to allow hold-over bills. So that that six to eight weeks of filing, enumerating and tracking downthe bills would be eliminated for the vast bulk of the bills, particularly those filed by incombent legislators. Secondly, better over-sight executive branch, by the legislature. Mr. President, this is the most important single reason for unrestircted annual sessions. How are we ever going as the people's representative, which we particularly are, in the House and the Senate, how are we ever going to have any overview of the actions of the Executive Branch, unless we have planery powers each year that we meet here. I know Senator Seymour Fallor, quite well, met him a few times in Albany, and Sy Fallor, through his welfare committee has actually brought about revoluntionary changes in health care in New York State. He's been a deamon on the trail because he has the investigative powers of the Legislative Branch to over-look the Executive Branch. This legislature shortof properly paid staff and housed meet in annual sessions through its chairman, regardless of whether controlling party or not, be conducting constant investigations of the Executive Branch, Welfare comes to mind, motor vehicle, highway, why did you do that wrong, why did you do this wrong and if not, how can we help you do it in a better way?

It may have been the case this

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We are, really, a major issue almost going through the motions if, in the second session, it is not unrestricted.

The third reason that the Eagleton Report gave was the development of an annual budgeting system. Which would be possible under the restricted bill. Next is the creation of full time staff assistance for the legislature and finally, a greater visibility of the legislature in the State. It's amazing, and I ask every member of this circle, to ask his constituents, a thousand of them, in front of any candy store on a Saturday afternoon, how often this legislature meets and I swear not 100 of them know that we don't meet every day all year round. But they seem to have the impression, that we're here all the time. And when I tell them, we have to wait for a bill for the town, or the District or something of great importance, I can't get it done because we won't meet until the odd numbered year in January, they are astonished. A very interesting aspect of the amendment, which I believe, would be fair to discuss briefly, at this time, because it's all one debate, if there is no objection, is that if committee bills are the only ones allowed under that amendment, or emgrgency bills any one party legislature the members of the opposite party wouldn't even have a chance to file bills. They'd be a complete shut-out, a gag-rule. It's bad enough being in the minority, but at least we can file our bills and at least get a hearing and get the public and sometimes we can even get through the Governor, certain issues, that we insit on being called. It may have been the case this morning.

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But under the proposal we need not even file bills because each committee, of course, would be controlled by the prevailing party. Now, what has the experience of the country been? This Yale Law School Report, points out that the trend in the United States if for unrestricted annual sessions. In 1945 only four states had unrestricted sessions. Today, 15 have such sessions. Four of these 15 states, changed to unrestricted annual sessions after having tried restricted sessions in the even years. There are only six states, today, with some form of restricted annual sessions. I suggest to you, that an interesting thought occurred that you could not have a special session during this restricted session, in case it might be needed. I suppose committee bills could solve this but I just raised that for consideration of the circle.

Now, in closing, Mr. President, a pattern is developing here that we're all aware of that is going to be the sad story of the 1969 general assembly. Mr. John Zaiman, emeinent journalist, reverted to it in an article yesterday. That is, that the control is so tight up here, the controlling party, that the final desisions on progressive legislation that some of want, that were made up here, and that pretty much of a head is given to the youngsters, the youngsters down in the House. The Billy Ratchfords and the Carl Ajellos are those heading your great party, and who are determined to do what they told the voters and what they feel this state needs. And as these issues come

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come up and I'll start keeping a list of them and this is issue no. 1, they're going to go through there with overwhelmeing margins and your party is going to look very good down there, serving the wishes of the people. And then they are going to get a cruel hold up in this session, up in this chamber and that's going to be the end. For indeed, Mr. President, I think this is a major issue. I think that the controlling party in this chamber, intends to and is going to make the Senate a boulevard of broken dreams. And you're going to see issue after issue come up, just like this one, to receive a cruel death blow, from the controlling party. SENATOR FAULISO:

Mr. President, I wish to remind the distingu@jhed Senator from the 24th, that the Democratic Party is truly one party. And that our unity has spelled victory after victory. And that, however, people, reasonable people have the right to differ, be they ^Democrats or Republicans. I know very little about the body of the Republican Pary, but after listening to the distinguished Senator, he sounded like he was conducting another requiem for his party. He doesn't hold out much hope. He speaks about the minority party, he speaks about one party being in controll. Now, Mr. President, for a long time, I've had some reluctance about being in favor of annual sessions. I read the Eagleton Report and I think it contains many good things and suggestions. When we started off, in this session,

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there were many people who made new promises. Now, the present system has provoked abuse, much abuse and that's because we are permitted to file bill after billy mountainous bills, 7000. Repetition of previous sessions, confusion and chaos which is normal position. It seems we are putting the cart before the horse. It seems that we have not cleaned up our own house. There is wide spread abuse, individually and collectively and there is utter confusion. Mr. President, if we produced or is we passed unlimmited annual sessions, we will compound this abuse. Why, in this very hall, this very assembly, it's very difficult sometimes to even gather the people in a particular caucus room. Sometimes I think that some people deliberately don't want to leave these chambers or these hallowed halls. I'm impressed with the fact that they like to be here. Some of them, I believe, ought to make application for squatters rights and camp here all year. Now, personnally, I'd like to see business conducted normally with regularity and expeditously. I think the Eagleton Report is noteworthy and significant. I think we ought to clean up our own house. I think that it is important that we put restriction. I think that if you opened up the flood gates, youre going to have the same bills. I foresee also, that people who are presiding can circumvent rules. They can be secured so that if you leave it to the people who preside you have also weaknesses. It is important that we take restrictions. It is important that these matters be re-

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stricted to budgetary or fiscal matters or matters raised in committee. I think you have to harness the individuals that come here. I think the people and the general public are asking questions. They want to know what we do here. What is it important that we are dealing with? Now we have called for public hearings and I mention this, Mr. President, because the greatest example of the abuse I'm going to find townorrow morning, in the House where this is going to take place. We have a rule that the Chairman would be somewhat in control of our public hearings. And then there is another rule which says, that if you have a petition you can demand a public hearing. Consequently, we are frustrating those things which would bring about regularity, would bring about some form of regularity, which I think is important. But we're going to hear, for the second time around, this question of busing children to schools. And that is because soome individual wants to take advantage of the political situation that may be inheritant in this great question. And the gentlemen who are apparenty behind this, think that this is important for him to have the truth. This is an example of the abuse. And I say, Mr. President, that we ought to clean up our own houses. I think we ought to do something about meeting promptly. I think that the board of directors meetings ought to go out the window. I know people have to come here on time. I think we weat- ought to take care of our business. I think we ought to take care and give priorities to the bills that the people are looking for. This abortion bill, the

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question of having a public hearing is because we yielded, and capitulated through the fair sex of the society and I respect them and admire them because they wanted a public hearing. I could repeat that refrain and so could Senator Hull. I heard him in a disitation to the members of the Judiciary, tell then about the abortion bill. We needed a public hearing on the abortion bill like we need a whole in the head. We need a public hearing on capitol punishment in the same fashion. NO concept bills, no fault concept, yes. The pollutions bills these are important questions. These things that hve been gone over, and over seems to be a waste of time, a waste of taxpayers! money. I'm going to vote for this annual session but I'm going to vote that it be restricted. I regret that I depart from my colleague from the second. I think he wants it unlimited but I think and I foresee great abuse and this is what we must stop. And this is what we ought to make our commencement with. the question of doing things first and the first things, seem to me, to clean up the abuses that now exist in both houses of this legislature, and then go on to the special business of this legislature providing for annual sessions. THE CHAIR:

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SENATOR RUDOLE: Mr. President and members of the Senate, just this afternoon, we observed a meeting of people from the City of Hartford and the surrounding areas. Of poeple who come from neighborhoods, and I'm a little bit disturbed that the good Senator from the First. is in favor of restricted sessions. People who are desperate, people who are in need of proper programs. People who truly are in need. I want to thank the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee for allowing them to speak because they came to the house and said they wanted to be heard. And I believe, Mr. President, this is exactly what we're talking about. There are people outside of this capitol, who are desperate, who have good intentions and who want to be heard. And for some reason or other, Mr. President, we are not listening. They sat in the Appropriations room and one after another said, we have problems, there is discontent, there are racial problems and we want you gentleman to appropriate funds. My point is this, that we have no right to go back to these people and say the session is over, come back and see us in 1971. We have an obligation to say to the people, next year we'll have another session and you can return and voice your opinion again and again. But for some reason or other, we have a built in program to allow a truly off-period between one session and the other. And I think it incombent upon this general assembly and the elected officals, to provide the people outside this building with a place to speak from. We've got to give them the

April 22, 1969 Page 29 opportunity to speak. It's too long in coming. I oppose the amendment, Mr. President and I hope that this Senate will support open sessions. SENATOR BARNES:

Mr. President and members of the circle, the interesting thing about the debate on this particular amendment is, that we find oursleves arguing, debating under the restrictions which are proposed, restrictions limiting sessions to revenue, budgetary manners are workable or whether they are not. WE've heard very little about the reason for limiting these sessions in the first place. Just what it is to be accomplished here? What fear is it that these restrictions are designed to meet? Because there seem very little reason, so far, on the floor this afternoon, to limit sessions in the way that they are supposed to be limited. The distinguished Senator Barry referred to a court case indicating that in his judgement this matter is well established that budgetary has been defined that if the principle purpose of the bill is to raise revenue and so forth that therefore, it's a budgetary or revenue matter. The mere fact that there had to be a court order proves exactly the objection that I'm raising. Why, knowingly, and with our eyes wide open go into a situation in which we know there are likely to be some judicial appeals? Why even raise this kind of a segment? Unless there is some genuine public purpose to be solved. Six states have limited budgetary sessions now, we've

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learned. How many of those are by Constitutional Amendment? How many of those are by Constitutional restriction? As opposed to either a restriction in the rules or by statute? The question remains, in spite of the length of this debate, Mr. President, that the question remains unanswered. The question why tie our hands? No ligitimate arguments have in fact, been advanced. Why tie our hands in this way, in this legislature and why raise the specter of additional hours of arguming of additional problems the constitutionality and court appeals by restricting the session in this way. Mr. President, I would ask, that when the vote be taken, on this amendment, that it be by roll-dall. SENATOR MARCUS:

Mr. President, I think that it's unfortunate that the distinguished Minority Leader keeps getting himself hung-up, on this matter of a session restricting to fiscal matters. This is not what is being opposed by Senator Barry at all. I thought that this had been made abundantly clear. The Eagleton Report which quite frankly, I think has been invaluable, which I also don't consider as being the Bible, being sacrosanct, in fact, recommended that there be no individual bills considered at all. That all bills brought before this circle and the legislature be in the form of committee bills. This, in fact, is the recommendation that will be contained in the amendment to be presented by Senator Barry. The Minority Leader is aware of this. He's aware of the fact that any bill which is truly in the public

April 22, 1969 Page 31 interest, any bill that goes beyond the scope of the private interest of one individual legislator or several members of the public will receive adequate hearing, will receive adequate attention based on the amendment to be presented.

So. really, I think we're getting oursleves hung-up on an issue that doesn't exist at all. The issue is not whether or not we're going to restrict the second year of an annual session bill, in fact, when enacted, to fiscal matters. The issue is whether or not we will keep out of that second year some bills. Bills, for example, that might call for a cannon being shot off at 3 a.m. in the morning; to keep the crows away from somebody's crop. Now, these are the kinds of things that if they are not enacted in the first year of the session, certainly, should not be reconsidered again. But certainly all of the reasons for having annual sessions, still relate to the amendment to be presented. I would also, Mr. President, very briefly, speaking of the comments made by the distinguished Assistant Minority Leader, point out that Connecticut does not have a unicameral system, it is a bi-cameral legislature, there certainly is room for disagreement between the two bodies, which hopefully can be compromised. It certainly does not mean that because we all belong to one party, in the Majority, we don't all necessarily have to think alike on every issue. This, in fact, of course, is what has distinguished the Democratic Party from any other party. That we can disagree and on the other hand we

April 22, 1969 Page 32 can, ultimately, get together and unite to those things which we feel are right for the people of the state. So let me point out, constitutionally, the reason we have a bi-cameral legislature is to move with the tradition in this country of checks and balances and I think it makes a great deal of sense. I do think, we are really hung-up on this debate on a very moderate difference between what appears to be the view of the Majority and the Minority.

May I just point out for charity, in answer to a couple of questions raised. First, in response to Senator Barnes' question about how many of the six states now which have limited sessions which my research shows seven, Utak having become the seventh in November 1968, in which of those states is done by Constitutional amendment and which by rules? May I say, Mr. President, all of these are contained, these restrictions are contained in the Constitution, of these various states. And secondly, I would like to point out to my good friend, Senator Hull, that when he refers to this study done by the Yale Law School, which by the way, was done at my request, and I have conferred on many occasions with Mr. Kasch and Mr. Taft and they are very thorough researchers. May I just point out to him, and to all of you, who may not have read this report, on the question of litigation, arising out of budgetary sessions, about that aspect of the amendment to come up beingpresented by me, on page 4 of this

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report, and quoting from the report, " with respect to budgetary fiscal sessions, " litigation under these budget clauses has not been a problem. In all ten states, there are ten states that have this, at some point in their history, there appears to be only one reported case, the Pennsylvania decision holding that a resolution was not a law, dealing explicitly with a budget clause." I see no problems in this, in terms of litigation. I think the law has well said it and as Senator Marcus has said, the resolution or the amendment that we will propose opens it up far beyond the budgetary exclusion in any event. THE CHAIR:

SENATOR BARRY:

Mr. President, I move the acceptance of House Amendment Schedule "B". The original bill contained in your file, on

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the first page thereof, indicates that the 90 day session should we pass this overall bill and should it be ratified by the people, would run from the first Monday, on the Wednesday following the first Monday in March in even numbered years until the Wednesday following the First Monday in June. The House has moved this earlier in the year by one month, running it from the Wednesday after the first Monday in February to the Wednesday after the first Monday in May. The reasons as were spelled out in the House are on the record there. Frankly the 90 day period, to me, doesn't make a great deal of difference whether it begins in February or it begins in March. I think the important thing is that we have the 90 day session. I would move that we accept the House Amendment Schedule "B".

SENATOR BARNES:

Mr. President and members of the circle, I rise to support this amendment. I've conferred with my colleagues, Senator Eddy, he tells me that this change doesn't interfere with the planting season, so therefore, I see no reason to oppose it. SENATOR MARCUS:

As long as we don't have to entertain that bill that shoots off a canon and scare the crows away, I find myself, in agreement with the Minority Leader.

SENATOR EDDY:

I'm just a little bit worried about this legislation that its going to make it possible for the birds to eat up the crops.

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This doesn't appear like to important legislation so I think to the Minority leader and the Majority Leader but to the few remaining farmers in this state, it is very important, and I just wanted to remind them.

Mr. President, we have over the past three-quarters of an hour or so, gone into pretty much the content of <u>Senate Amend-</u> <u>ment Schedule "A"</u>. However, let me say, as Chairman of the Constitutional Amendment Committee, that I acknowledge that the bill which came out of that committee, is an extremely tight one and I think, Sir, the deliberations in the House through the deliberations here, both in caucus and here on the floor, we are going to afford a really, much better bill than what came out of committee. As a matter of fact, the bill that came out of committee, which restricted this session to strictly budgetery matters, would have made it the most restrictive in the United States.

Now, commenting on the amendment, itself, really, what else is there that should be brought up in the even yeared sessions; that can't be brought up under the provisions of this amendment? First of all, everything of a budgetary nature, everything whose over lying principle purpose has to do with the budget, has to do with levying taxes, has to do with raising revenue can be submitted to this legislature by bills in resolution form that would be properly before the legislature. Everything that is the product of an interim committee has the opportunity to become

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a committee bill. And I resent the notion, that the committee being in charge at the present time, both in the House and in the Senate of the same party chairman, that this becomes necessarily a one party gag-rule. We have, at least those of us in the Judiciary Committee now, and I know on the Constitutional Amendment committee, bills submitted by members of both parties, which came out either in their own name or which came out in the composite type bill as a committee bill. So that I think under the provision of this an endment having to do with bills and resolutions of committees of the general assembly that the great products of the interim committees which have merit. the expression of response to public needs, not following withing the budgetary provisions, will be amply brought up under the heading of committee bills. Now, all of us know, that you can't go to a committee, even a comittee of which you are a member, which perhaps, you are a long time member, with all of the meritable bills which we come up with year after year. Nobody would go to the Chairman of the Committee and ask them to raise a bill that really didn't have some important meaning, to the people of Connecticut. And what we really ought to be doing here, it seems to me, in the even year sessions, is telling the people what we want to bring up, that we want to deliberate in the off year, so-called now, are those matters which came up in the interim, those matters of an emergency nature, those matters which are compelling and which the time

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has come and not have to wiat 18 or 16 months until the new session comes aground. And some people who have argued against this rule of annual sessions has said, so we've already got a special session procedure, and I would only like to say that, Eagleton had some remarks about that and I quote. " let's face it. while some special sessions are technical sessions possible for anything, the fact is that there has to be a really extreme emergency before one is called and when we do have special sessions. they are always disorderly and chaotic." I submit to you. Mr. President, that in all three of the areas of this amendment, will bring before the public and will bring the public here. if our rules control hearings adequately and our Chairman control them adequately, will amply serve both what comes out of the committee and whatever business comes into the committee from the public. And we will be spared the great flood of bills, 5 to 6000, and I tried all day to get a bill from the comptroller's office, by the way, and I wasn't able to get it in time. Bit I think the people of this state would be interested to know that fact. I think they'd be interested that when they go to the polls, hopefully in November of 1970, and they are going to decide whether or not we can come here in an even year session. I think they'd like to know, what it costs to print all of those bills which have to do with shooting off guns. which have to do with putting warning lables in the soles of shoes and a great many other inconseq ential things, and I'm

Page 41 April 22, 1969 not. no offense to Senator Eddy, but we all know that all of these bills, are not worthy of presentation to the people and you know as well as I do, Mr. President, that they end up in a great waste basket. And they cost the people of this state a great deal of money. This is just one item, that I think will be spared and I think we can go and we can campaign in 1970 on this issue and we can go to the people and say to them, we can better manage the state on an annual basis, we can better propose a budget on an annual basis, that we can do it at a greater cost and a greater efficiency. For one thing, because we don't have this clutter of bills. And we've got them this time and you can talk about all the rules you want, we're going to have them for some time to come, and who is that I heard, in the house say, don't bput it in the Constitution, let's leave it to the rules. Who is there here and who is there in the House that knows that if he's going to be here in two years, that he's going to be in any position to control the rules. I say let's the people decide this, let's let them have the referendum on this question and let's let them put in the Constitution, what restrictions they want on items that we can entertain in here. 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Members of the circle, I rise to support this amendment. Having lost the fight to have sessions open and unrestricted, I think that this amendment is an imporovement over the language that came to us in the House. It does provide more leeway which was the main objective of the thrust of our arguments earlier in attempting to restore the version that the House sent to us. I would note, however, that I think that the effect that this amendment is going to increase the power of the party that happens to be in power at the time, whether it be my party or the other party. Certainly the provision that only committee bills can be raised and only emergency certification can be usedd obviously. concentrates very significant powers in the even numbered sesseions, in those who control the legislature. I would prefer to see all bills that were introduced at the start of the session and in the long session, we might call it, carried over. Provide, perhaps, that no knew legislation be introduced but carry over the bills that are already in. It seems to me that this would tighten and insure the participation on the part of all members of the legislature, not just the committee chairman and the political leaders.

So, I don't see that the fbood of bills argument is one that is very persuasive. But be that as it may, rather than defeat this and find ourselves faced with a much more restrictive type of short session in the even numbered years, I would support this amendment as an improvement over what is now before us.

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SENATOR MARCUS:

I also join in supporting the amendment. My feelings relating to it were previously expressed. I would like to point out to the Minority Leader, however, that in reality the fact that bills would have to be raised by Joint Committee in no way differs from the existing situation where a committee must bring out a favorable or unfavorable report to a piece of legislation. The only distinction, of course, is in the raising of the bill. So that, in fact, this has nothing to do with politics at all. Certainly, the feeling of those who advocate this amendment is not based on any particular consideration but only on the feeling that this is what is best for the people of the State of Connecticut.

SENATOR HULL:

Mr. President, it is of wry interest, After one has been in the position so long, it seems to look a little different. I am not admitting for a moment, that my party isn't going to control both houses of this assembly and the Governor's chair in 1970, I sincerely believe that. But I don't want us to have all that power either and I want to give Senator Marcus a very good example of why this is wrong. Under the rules a d with the cooperation of Senator Pickett, I insisted on a public hearing on some bills concerning code of ethics. I had to insist quite hard. We had a hearing Monday, now, under this amendment, which I will, reluctantly support because of the ancient principle

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of half a loaf being better than none, under this amendment nobill in existence on which to have ahearing. And then, Governor Dempsey would not have had to call a press conference this morning, to say that he wanted a code of ethics bill right away. because he didn't want to get this confused until we had that hearing yesterday morning and at my request, on bills which we introduced, as elected representatives of the people, under the present system. And believe me. Mr. President, members of this circle, it would really be, whichever party, it might be that control both houses would be gag-rule, the minority would often has and your side had some constructive suggestions through the years when we were fortunate enough in those dear dead days of long ago, that we controlled both hourses. The Minority party might just as well stay home, if only the committee is to raise bills, however, we will support it because we must, it is a move toward annual sessions . SENATOR STANLEY:

Mr. President, I rise to explain my vote. I find myself perhaps for the second time, this afternoon going to vote yes. When in fact, the question is put, I intend to vote no. And I am going to vote yes, because I feel that if I've got to live with annual sessions, and if the people of this state have, that this amendment, what I think we should do, but I want it clearly understood that I do not support nor intend to vote for annual sessions and there is another question I would like to ask. I

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notice over here, they keep mentioning the carbine cannon, is this the issue that's coming under attack, today? They talk about the cannon that frightens the birds? That's a darn good bill. I fought very haid for that carbide cannon and I would say this, if you came from the 19th District, and had respect for the farmers in Bozrak and Lebanon and Lisbon and I would fight again for that, and I would hope that if we do have annual sessions that something that important might come up under emergency certification. Thank you, Mr. President. SENATOR ALFANO:

I rise, primarily, to correct a statemtn made by Senator T. Clark Hull, in reference to the code of ethics bill. I want to call your attention, Senator Hull, to a public hearing that was held before the committee on Public Personnel, approximately two months ago. You will find that at that hearing, there was heard a bill, in regard to code of ethics for officers and state employees and it was a pretty broad bill. The only person to appear at that hearing, at that time, on that bill was myself I introduced that bill, for the Administration and for the Democratic Party and I appeared at that time, on behalf of Governor Dempsey, in support of that bill. I want to make the record clear, clear that the Governor has always been for acode of thics. This Administration bill was submitted at his request and I appeared before the committee, in person, the public personnel committee, at his request and I think the Chairman

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of that committee if he exhibits the record or the transcript of the hearing at that time, would expose my appearance there on behalf of the Governor and the Administration.

THE CHAIR: Question is on the Senate Amendment Schedule "A".

SENATOR FAULISO:

I know the hour is getting late, but it strikes me as very strange that we've debated this such a long time and that noone ever memtioned how much it's going to cost the taxpayer. No one has projected any figures. But it's simple arithmatic that the restricted annual sessions won't cost us less and the taxpayers are going to say, amend THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks? Senator from the 11th requested that a roll call be taken on this amendment. SENATOR HAMMER:

Mr. President, with regard to this amendment, Senate Amendment schedule "A", I intend to support it but I just can't help but rise and to say that I think it is extraordianary language to put into the Constitution. This is language that we use in the context of the rules of the general assembly in 1969. In 20 years, I ask you, Mr. President, how do we know what these words, for instance, bills raided by joint committee are going to mean? Thes are not words that have an inherit meaning so out of context they mean little or nothing. I really object to this very much since I've been inthe general assembly and have

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taken any part in forming or voting for Sonstitutional Amendments I've always tried to keep in mind, what is a Constitutional issue, what is not a Constitutional issue, and what is proper language to be used in the Constitution of the State of Connecticut and I don't think these are proper words, However, this amendment is a vast improvement of what was printing in the bill originally and if it's the best we can get, I accept it. Let me while I'm on my feet say something about carbine cannons. I'm glad Senator Stanley went out. The nuisance cabbide cannons are extremely objectionable things day in, day out, hour in and hour out to many of our constituents. I am for the bill and everybody else has taldked about it and I'll do so right now, myself, I don't want to hear cabide cannons now or later. THE CHAIR:

In the opinion of the Chair, Senate Amendment Schedule, "A" is adopted. The Chair will rule that it is a technical amendment and may be part of House Joint Resolution No. 160 as amended by House Amendment Schedule "B" and Senate Amendment Schedule "A" can now be taken up. SENATOR BARRY:

Mr. President, I move acceptance for the Joint Committees favorable report of raised Resolution No. 160 as amended by the House, House Amendment Schedule "B" and as amended by the Senate Amendment Schedule "A".

Mr. President, I think that a great deal has been said about the merits of annual sessions as opposed to our present bienniel sessions already. However, this is a great departure from what our history has been for some 70 years and I think a

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few remarks should be made about the history of our general assembly and about why we should adopt this resolution. And I would point out that from 1638 until 1819, members of this general assembly came here in April and in September of the same year and during that period of time, held 365 regular sessions. From 1820 until 1887, annual sessions prevailed here. From 1899 until the present time we have met biennielly. You might be interested to know, we referred earlier about the infrequency of special sessions. Back during the 18th and 19th century, there were a great many more special sessions and they were held for such things as, defense against Indians and defense against the Dutch and defense against Pirates and Privateers, all of which, problems we don't have today so perhaps, that's the reason we don't have special sessions.

I want to comment about the statistics of other states. In spite of what the air it all, Legislative Service had to say, your up to date figures show, that 27 of the 50 states have annual sessions and that seven of them are restricted. I might also point out that Ohio, Illinois, Tennessee and Vermont will hold annual sessions during 1967 and '68 by not adjourning sine die to the Constitutional amendment. In 1967 in New Hamphire went to a referendum and the people of New Hampshire voted for annual sessions. However, they put the question wrong on the ballot and it was visisted by the Supreme Court. There is a trend toward annual sessions as our business becomes greater,

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as our budgets become greater and the business of these states become more and more busy. In 1941, there were only ½ states that met annually. In 1950, there were 10. In 1960 17 or 18 and today there are 27. Now, why should we have annual sessions? I will be very brief, cebtainly all of us would agree, I would think, that we can predict that if we are to be the power of the purse, if we are to be able to make the budget and if we are to approve the budget and to give the appropriations carpying out the items of the b dget then, we stand a fare batter chance of having a balanced budget if we do this over a twelve month period rather than over a twenty-four month period.

All of us know that the Governor begins to hold hearings with the departments in late summer projecting some thirty months ahead. It takes the work of a Solomon to predict the needs and economy of the State of Connecticut in that period of time. Certainly, to get this State on an annual budget would be one of the great motivations of having annual sessions.

Secondly, I would think that we would have a much better professional staff and we should have a much more professional staff in this general assembly. We should have fiscal advisors independent of the legislatures, it seems to me. And not have to rely solely upon the budgetary department. I don't think we're going to get that fiscal advisors, if we don't meet here annually. I don't think we're going to get the staff of highquality unless we are here every year. And certainly, if we are

needs and deficiency of our times. It enables the legislature

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here during some form annually, we're going to be better able to meet the needs of the people which arise after the June adjournment of the odd numbered year.

Our interrelationship with the Federal Government, it seems to me, is another aspect of why we should be here every year. And so, I think the system is compelling. I think we've made it more compelling here today. And I would hope that between now and November of 1970, if this should receive the three-quarters necessary here. That those of us, who feel as I do, and those of us who feel as most of us do, would be able to go to the people and to say that this is not a self-serving bill. That this is not something that we want for ourselves. That this is something that we want so that the business of the poeple of the State of Connecticut and the Government of the State of Connecticut can be more efficiently operated. I move adoption. SENATOR BARNES:

Mr. President and members of the circle, I rise to support the resolution. It seems to me that this is perhaps one of the most important peieces of legislation that this session will pass at this time and if with unified support from both political parties, the voters see fit to act on this in 1970. We will have started the process of bringing the Connecticut Legislature into the 20th century. The most important three reasons, it seems to me and perhaps in order even would be that it enables the legislature to respond faster to some of the urgent, social needs and deficiency of our times. It enables the legislature

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to react on a more timely basis to changes and to programs, Federal policies and finally, unquestionably, it will ease the budgetary task, make it much easier, make it more exact to anticipate with more accuracy revenue estimates. I would guess that the run away deficits that we are presently experiencing in this state, might have been avoided if we had had annual sessions.

So, in general, I would urge that we vote on this and I would hope that we might vote unanimously, if not, hope that we could secure the necessary three-quarters margin to bring this before the voters in 1970. Because I am convinced that once we go on annual sessions, the State will be better run. It will be more responsive and our legislature will be more responsive, too. SENATOR MARCUS:

Mr. President, I don't need to say, that it comes to a surprise to anyone, that I rise in support of the resolution. Mr. President, I submit to you that Connecticut has been very fortunate over the past years by having many devoted, conscientous legislators on both sides of the aisle. I think it's very obvious, however, that we can't afford to be drag picking, screaming into the 1970's. That the complexities of our society require and in fact, demand, the legislature meet on an annual basis. I think it's been sheer luck that we've managed as well as we have up until now. Connecticut, 1970 and 1971 and the future can't afford to operate and cost factor has been intro-

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duced. I don't think we can afford to operate without annual sessions. I think we have to forget about the horse and buggy days. We have to forget about the days when government was enacted via a town meeting. Those may very well be glorious days of the past but they're gone forever. We now have days when government has to react, react rapidly to the many problems that we all face. So I submit to you, Mr. President, that the resolut on before us, as amended, is something which will be good for all of the people of the state. And I am very hopeful that we will receive an almost unanimous vote, in this circle. On behalf of the concept of annual sessions and I look forward to working on behalf of the enactment by the people of the State. SENATOR ALFANO:

Mr. President, I feel that I should stand in support of this bill, this resolution. I feel it's long past due. The State of Connecticut should have adopted annual session bill years ago. We are operating, in the State of Connecticut, as what is known as big business. By big business, I mean, we are handling a budget in excess of two billion dollars a year.

It is inconceivable that any business organization, that is well-run, has its board of directors meet every three or four months every two years in order to operate this business. I feel also, that it is inconceivable to think that any type of government, even our smaller governments, don't expect our school districts or our school boards to meet biennieally, four or five

April 22, 1969 Page 55 months every two years. None of ous expect our City Council that operates the City or Town Government to meet four or five months every two years and properly and adequately operate the government of the community.

I think, too, the general assembly is a form of the people expect to go to, to redress, to have their problems solved. My constituents annually, after this session adjourns, I find that they are calling me on the telephone, their writing letters to their legislator. It is very difficult to explain to them sure you elected me, for a term of two years, but basically I went out of office in June. I served for five months. My name is still your Senator from the Seventh District but my authority as your legislator expired in June. There is nothing I can do to help you, handle your problem. An elected official should be able available and accessible to his constituents, to the people of the state, at all times. I think, at least, with this annueal session bill, we can cope with the problems of the people they can contact their legislators and expect results from them annually not only once every two years.

SENATOR EDDY:

Mr. President, I rise primarily just to make some passing comment on this bill. I'm going to support it for I think a rather weak reason. I campaigned for it. Everybody who said, where do you stand on annual sessions, I said, I'm for it. So I'd have to repudiate a lot of promises now, to say that I'm

April 22, 1969 Page 56 suddenly against it. But I think that it's fair, at this time, since it will go to a referendum, I feel confident, to at least, remark on a few thoughts, that might be given as people vote on this.

One is, that the character of this general assembly, of both the house and the senate, is going to dramatically change. The type of people who will be able to serve up here will change. No longer will anybody be able to do this, you might say, a part time basis. There are many people in this circle, who just would not and could not do this, if they were up here on a permanent basis. Now, this dowsn't mean that the new faces here, will not be equally good. I am not implying that. There will be more retired people, there will be fewer women, there will be fewer young men. Young men just won't be able to spare the time. It's going to change this general assembly, unless, and I have no doubts about that. I heard statistics from Florida about how it doesn't anymore to have annual sessions or bienniel. I don't think they have to heat their capitol, that may have something to do with it. But at any rate, I think all of us with common sense, know this is going to cost the State of Connecticut more money. Now, maybe it's more efficient. Maybe it's moot, but it's going to cost the state more money to have annual sessions. Now, secondly, or possibly last, I find it diff icult to say this without throwing in a little partisan comment, and I

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don't think I'm going to. But, you know, the State of Connecticut. year in and year out, has been well run. This is what always I'm proud of, when people come in from New York and they say. how do you do it? You have all the services you need and your taxes are 40% lower than New York? Rhode Island, we're always being compared, you know. Other states have this, we should do it. I said, sometimes, I'm glad that we don't have what these other states have. Because we seem to have a pretty well run state, here. Now, I think one of the reasons that a lot of us are now going to vote for this, is, there seems to be a sort of prestige, in our Administration. It sort of shellshocked and we thing that if only we could be up here every year, we wouldn't have this crisis. Maybe it's true. But if we got an administration, that possibly wasn't so tired and didn't have this shell shocked defective probably we wouldn't need annual sessions. I don't know. I'm going to support this bill. Let the people have a chance in it but let them alos know this marks a real departure. There's going to be a change in government. It is going to cost us more money. Thank you. SENATOR FAULISO:

I don't think we have to worry about heat. After all, we could always generate plenty of heat in this capitol. But I rise to pay tribute to the distinguished Senator from the Fourth. I think he made an excellent presentation. He presented the facts. He presented the law. I won't have time to review his April 22, 1969 Page 58 citations but I think he made an excellent case out of it and I'm going to vote for this measure. SENATOR STANLEY:

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Mr. President and members of the circle, I address you today, with all of the respect that you deserve and I stand in opposition to what I'm sure most of you, will vote for. And I do it because I do believe, deeply, that the benefits that will accrue the State of Connecticut, will id no way be commensurate to the state.

I heard it said here, that those who would stay with what we've got would be horse and buggy. I don't believe that's true. I think the comment from my fellow Senator made, that we have earned the respect of other states in this country. That we have been a pace setter. That we have not raised taxes when those around us have. I think it's pretty good testamony to the fact that whatever we're doing, we're doing right. At least in principal. I feel, very deeply. because I campaigned against annual sessions. I should speak and I should vote against it. But I would say this, in reference to the horse and buggy age and also the distinguished Senator Chark Hull. who mentioned we must be chose to the people. Who, in this circle, has been able to answer the letters they receive? Who has the secretaries? Who has the staff? Last week, I got 438 letters and I don't have a secretary. And for the past week, we were unable to contact any department heads cause we didn't

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have a telephone book and they changed the numbers. And I cannot make a call anywhere in the State, from my home, except, by paying for it myself. And I have no research staff, although I'm Chairman of two committees. I think we must look at the total. And I think before we go into annual sessions, the people of this state, and the State of Connecticut, would be well served if we modernized. This is only the second session, that we have met after reapportionment. How the system will work can only be judged by one full session and a fragment of the second. I, personnally, ggree with those that say it is going to cost the state a great deal more money. And if you want annual sessions, and if indeed, you want t communicate with the people and be in touch with them, there are other alternatives that I suggest, perhaps, more workable.

I haven't heard anyone support the idea, that we might meet one day a week, every week, every year. Which would put you in very close touch with your people. I would say just one other thing and let me close with this. I will vote, today, as I intend to vote in the referendum. In opposition to annual sessions. But if the vote were close, here today, and if the people were to be denied the opportunity to vote on this question and in fact, they will make the decision, not us, I would vote to put it to a vote. I, honestly, believe, that the deficit, in no way, can be attributed to the fact that we don't meet twice a year. And I would go counter to those who say it April 22, 1969

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I think that if we did meet every year, the deficit would be greater than it is. Maybe we would have raised taxes sooner but the expenses would have been greater. So having said that, let me say, I do not believe when the question is voted on, by the people, that I will be in such a minority as I am in the legislature, here in Hartford, this year. SENATOR RUDOLF:

Mr. President, I rise to support this bill. How can you possibly forecast the economy of the State of Connecticut two years prior to the end of the legal session? All of us in this chamber know, that it is impossible. And I have said over and over agin, that if Governor Dempsey, has the ability to forecast the economy of this state, at the beginning of a session and the session ends in June, that he should not be Governor, but, he should be a very wealthy financeer on wall street.

However, Mr. President, I would kike to say this, that this general assembly, is taking a giant step eff forward in the right direction, today. We can make the various improvements, that Senator Stanley has mentioned, in his remarks, as we go along. It is going to be difficult. It is not going to be easy approaching a new method of legislating. We are all going to have to make sacrifices. Because there is nothing in si ght, of increased salaries. And the general public must be made aware of this. We are going to be asked to come back the second year, sacrifice, make ourselves available, to the general public

April 22, 1969 Page 61 and consider the important legislation, before us. I support the annual session bill. SENATOR LUPTON:

Mr. President, I rise to support this bill. Although, I have to say that I do so with an admission of defeat. I agree very much, with what the Senator of the 19th has said. And I'm even going to reserve decision on how I'm going to vote on the referendum. But I believe, today, that the over-riding principle is that we have a continuing legislative body in this state, which, works constantly in a coordinate position. with the Executive Branch. Something we have sorely missed, I believe, in recent years, particularly. But I say. I am hear to admit defeat because I have been trying to sell this general assembly for years, on a one day a week legislature which I think would fit very well, because we are, geographically, a small state. However, I'd like to read these few lines, in supporting the bill because I think they give my position more clearly. Reluctantly, I am here to lend support, however, I contend the more we meet, the more we'll spend. Reluctantly, I can see a more used legislative plea with no more room for you and me. One session day, each week, just one would get the people's business done. And any citizen could run. Thany you, Mr. President. SENATOR AMENTA:

Mr. President, members of the circle, just very briefly, I

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would like to rise to say, that I am going to support the bill and I'm going to support it for a very simple reason. I've been elected, to come to the Senate, to the legislature, and I've been elected to do a good job. And I feel and I hope that usually, when I undertake something. I do a good job. But presently, under the circumstance, and under the conditions that we are forced to work under, we just cannot do a good job. Just take a look at this beautiful peice of wood in front of you. If you want to reach for something inside, you lose everything on top of the table. If you want to answer a letter, which many of us receive, by the hundreds, every week, you just can't do it because there is not the personnel to do it. If you look for a little space, where you may want to attempt to write a letter, yourself, or a speech, which you may want to make to your constituents, you just can't do it. This leads up to just one thing. It doesn't make sense that to have all these facilities and use them five months every two years. And this is the reason why I'm going to vote for the annual sessions. I am not so sure that I can afford to come back, under annual sessions. But this doesn't make it any less meaningful. If we are here to do a good job, then we have to have the facilities with which to do this good job. And these facilities are forthcoming if we're going to use them only five months every two years. I think that this is the main reason for voting the annual sessions.

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has been missed. That if we are adequately staffed, we could have our space, desks and telephones and not this situation, where I had to steal a desk in the corner of the Minority room and some one was mixing egg salad on it, when I came in this morning. We, lawyers are so used to being the whipping boys of this general assembly, that its like a way of life now and I don't even get mad anymore. We're people too, you know. And the fact is, it would be easier for most of us if there were annual sessions. Very clearly so, and I've talked to people in New York. And up until very recently. New York State. ended the sess ion on the 10th of April and believe me I think any practicing lawyer would tell you, it would be much easier to be away 3 and a half months and one of these sessions would only be 90 days. It would be much easier to be away 3 months than five months altogether. Because you lose entire contact with you client, your cases and everything else. I don't agree for a moment, a different type of person will be here. I assume the pay is going to go up and these other professional and different type of people who are here, would be exactly the same type as now. But it would be a little easier, on the lawyer members who do so much of the work here whether the opponents wish to admit it or not. It would be a little bit easier, if you had two shorter sessions than one five month session. Now, finally, the argument because we're not efficient. We should not meet is really a difficult argument. Under the brilliant

April 22, 1969 Page 65 Majority leadership, that we have here, we certainly have made some improvements. And wehen we take over, we're going to make a lot more. And we're going to run this place, efficiently. And we're going to have legislative pay and if we have to build a new capitol annex, we're going to have space and we're going to have postage and we're going to have telephones too.

Mr. Hubert Stone, my distinguished friend, who is the head of the Connecticut Public Expenditure Council, told me that they were going to be against annual sessions. I said, We're the board of directions, of the State. How often do you meet? He said, we have an annual meeting every year. I said, well, if the Connecticut Public Expenditure Council needs an annual meeting, how in Heaven's dake can they or anyone else say that the Board of Directors of the State, doesn't need an annual meeting.

SENATOR LUPTON:

This is a very historic matter, this matter of changing our Constitution to meet annually. I don't want to be misunderstood, or even deliberately, misinterpreted about where I stand on this. Certainly, it's going to be more convenient for lawyers to come up and other people. That isn't the reason why we're discussing this thing. Certainly, it's going to be more expensive. Because, obviously, the law of experiences of the legislature has always been the more they meet, the more they spend. We don't need to quibble about the actual cost of eoperating the legislature. That's not the debate. April 22, 1969

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It seems to me, that there is a danger, as we openly move into this annual session, as we are planning to do. That it will become a very professional body. And it will not be represented in the way that it has been, in this great State for many, many years. I think it will be a great loss. I wish to be clearly understood when I will predict that it will become professional. That it will not give the opportunities for people who wish to who are hard working, blue collar people, to get away to come and serve here. It won't be easy for busy executives but it will be quite possible for the professionals. And those who do the work, many of whom and most of whom, are attorneys-atlaw. I have nothing against them, excepting to say that in terms of their percentage of toal population, in the State of Connecticut, they are not truly representative. SENATOR MARCUS:

This debate has lasted for close to three hours and I think we all understand the issues. Senator Lupton, in his own iniminable fashion, is kind of playing both sides of the fence. The fact of the matter is, none of us, as members of the legislature, should defensive about the issue of annual sessions at all. I don't think that we, in the Majority are supporting the concept because it's good for legislators. I think we're supporting it because we feel that Connecticut requires annual sessions. Not because it's going to create a better atmosphere for legislators or more staff or automation which of course.

Mr. President, I rise to oppose this bill. It seems to me, that the difficulties that are often read about and that we know from our personnal experiences, today in terms of safety as well as discipline on the school bus, lowering the age to 19, would be a very dangerous move. Also, t seems to me, it is inconsistent with other action that we have taken recently, by this body, in which we prevented drivers under 21 from giving instructions on the road. If drivers under 21 are not qualified or sufficiently able to give instruction to other drivers on the highway, it seems inconsistent to suggest that they qualify to drive a school bus, where the lives of many children are at stake. I would look upon this as dangerous legislation and it doesn't seem to me, to be sufficient reason for imposing it has been advanced.

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SENATOR BURKE: shill deen ride on the buses, and happened to be

Mr. President, I wish to point out to the Senator Barnes, that each driver must be found capable by skilled inspectors of the Motor Vehicle Department. He also must pass a rigorous requirements of the school bus owner, whose very existence depends on the performance of safety and efficiency. I would like to further point out, Mr. President and members of the circle, that this bill was supported at the public hearing, by the Motor Vehicle Department, Connecticut Motor Association, the School bus Division and the Easter School Bus Contractor. I rise on a point of personnal privilege. Mr. President and members of the circle, we have visiting us today in the gallery, some Cadet Girl Scouts from Avon Troop No. 358. They are accompanied by their leader and a mother. SENATOR HOULEY:

Mr. President, I rise for the purpose of an introduction. I would like to introduce four of my number one critics, my wife, Helen, my son, James, Francine and Elizabeth. my daughters.

At 2:14 P.M. the President Pro Tempore took the Chair. SENATOR MARCUS:

Mr. President, I rise on a point of personnal privilege. Mr. President with a great deal of delight, I introduce to the circle, some people who should be very familiar to you, your wife, Mary, and four of your children sitting in the gallery. SENATOR MARCUS:

Mr. President, I rise on a point of order. It appears that yesterday, while the Senate was at ease, and in session, during

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a period of time that Senator Hammer and myself, were engaged in a metting with the New Haven Human Relations Council and during the period of time that the remaining Democratic Senators were in deliberation in caucus. Review ing the bills that were starred on the Calendar. Several members of this circle, including the Minority Leader, engaged in a rather childish shoe-banging episode that was reminiscent of what went on when Mr. Krushev controlled things in Russia.

It seems to me, Mr. President, that this is in direct intervention of Rule 3 of the Senate Rules. It appeared to me as if, under the circumstanced, a public rebute should be make by view of the Senators involved. That they should be reminded of their responsibilities to the people of the State, and the other members of the General Assembly.

It also seems to me, Mr. President, that its truly a fair day, in the State of Connecticut, when a Minority Leader of a major party, condones and participates in this type of activity.

SENATOR ALFANO:

Members of the circle, I definitely feel the people of Connecticut have every right to expect their legislators when in the Legislative Chambers of this Capitol, to conduct themselves with dignity and decorum.

SENATOR HULL:

Mr. Chairman, point of order, I object to you commenting

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Mr. Chairman, before we've had a chance to speak. This is a matter of public significance, in which we are being taught with a public rebuke. I think it is unseemingly and out of order, of you, to make this honor before you have heard from us. SENATOR MARCUS:

Mr. President, we know, of course, that debate of any sort rule 3 indicates that whatever your desision it may be subject to an appeal. But there is to be no debate at all. SENATOR ALFANO:

As presideng officer, I must say I can not dondone this conduct. of some of the Senators in this chamber, yesterday. We are all elected legislators, of this assembly. We should set an example for the people of this State, of the proper manner of which one should conduct himself not only as public officials but as citizens. Expressing our opposition or our grievances to problems. It is an establish fact, that in our democratic society has been to accomplish this with discussion, negotiation and in the form of this nature debate, if necessary. on the floor of these chambers, by using your voices to express yourself but not with shoes off of your feet. Let's always remember we are always in the eyes of the public. Let's set a good example here, to the youth and to the people of our State. I trust that, we will not have another display of yesterday's episode, again in this chamber. SENATOR BARNES:

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Mr. President and members of the circle, what started yes terday as a spontaneous demonstrations of frustration over the way this chamber has been managed is a protest against the farce, against the legislative procedure, which this chamber has become. It's something that we intend to continue. I respect your word, **sir**, and this very same citation which you refer to of setting a good example for the people of this state and the youth of this state is something that we have very much in mind. And certainly, the kind of secret debate, that goes on in that Senate caucus chamber, on the Democratic side, and the kind of back-room decisions that **a**re made here, and the abuse of power that is exemplified by the way the Democratic Majority rule this chamber. Is exactly in point, sir. Exactly in point and very much a part of the disillusionment that many of the youth of our country feel at this time.

There's a wide gap, a very wide gap between expectation and reality in this country in a wide variety of ways. But we know also, there's a worde gap between expectation and reality in terms of a political process. We know that the great frustration and discontent of the political process in this country.

What goes on, in this Senate, day after day after day. This Senate is called to order at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and then we as elected representatives of the people, and the news media and other members of the public, who are here interested

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April 24, 1969 in the public's business, cool their heels while all the important debate and the difficult and important desisions are made behind chosed doors. Is exactly the kind of thing, Mr. President, that contributes to the disillusion of our youth.

It isn't necessary apparently to run the House of Representatives that way. But for some reason it is necessary in the eyes of the Majority Leader and others who run the Senate this way.

Now, we were elected to serve in this chamber and have points of view known. We were elected to debate bills out in the open. That's what we're here for. And perhaps, the demonstration, yesterday, wasn't in the very best taste, but it was one that was spontaneous and it was one that everyone here felt. It expressed the frustration that we have felt for a long time, in the way things are run, here.

There is an arrogance of power, Mr. President, in the way this Senate is being run. An agrogance of power that gags freedom of debate. It's an arrogance of power that puts bill after bill after bill to the foot of the Calendar while later on it may be traded for political purposes. There is a one man rule, in this Senate and I wonder sometimes if the Senators are being used for convenience. I wonder if it isn't being run to accommodate whatever meetings he has. There are 35 other members of this chamber, net-enty let alone other members of the public. Of course, sometimes, it is necessary to have

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meetings but there are other people who can run this chamber. There is no need to have a non-consent calendar with little if anything on it controversial, hang over until 5:30 or 6 o'clock in the afternoon.

Something more than 24 hours of total time has been spent in this Senate in recess. This is poor scheduling, It isn't necessary; it's a travesty on the legislative process. We are just, tired of being pushed around, Mr. President. And in pushing us around, I might add, in effect youre pushing the public around, as well. Because it is the public's business that's suffering. We may experience the frustrations but it's the public who is suffering from not having these matter debated on in public, out here on the floor, where the arguments that go on in the Democratic caucus room. Not the details but we know that a strong difference of opinion exists in there.

What's wrong with sharing that with the public? If you have strong differences of opinion, bring them out here, you know we might agree with you. We might be of some assistance. We might shed some light on the argument as it develops.

This is what the legislative process is supposed to be all about. So, we did what we had to do, yesterday Mr. President. And we shall continue to do this. I have here, in this desk, a symbol, that I intend for you to see, sitting on this desk. sitting on this desk at long as the Senate is run the

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way it has been run in this session. This symbol is going to sit here as long as this Senate is run the way that it has been in the past. As an example, the kind of strong political tactics that exist here and the way this has been run in the most undemocratic prosess. A way which has called for repression, abbitrary decisions, secret caucuses, ocasionally back-room deals and the public be damend attitude.

Now, I say, Mr. President, you can censor us every day of every week, if you wish, that we're in session. We shall continue to protest in any way that we can even though we may be out-voted 2 to 1. We will continue to protest until we can get the public's business out in the open and out in this chamber.

SENATOR MARCUS:

Mr. President, we all are, of course, aware of the fact that Senator Barnes' comments were very much out of order. Your decision was one, of course, that order and decorum be maintained in this chamber. Therefore, I would take it, in effect he is appealing your decision. I also find it rather unseemingly, to become involved in any kind of personnal dispute with Senator Barnes. I don't intend to be dragged down, to that level of politics. But, let's just point out a few facts, Senator Barnes has kind of taken the bit in his mouth and he is indicating that somehow the Democratic process prohibits debate on the floor and is not in the best interest of

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the public. Well, I submit to Senator Barnes, no one shuts him off. He may debate and oppose any bill taken up on the floor of this circle. We're not making his decisions for him. Now. if he'd like to be invited into our caucus or that we can explain some of these bills, to him and maybe for a change. get the benefit of some constructive thinking, which we have yet to receive, in the course of this session. Why, you're invited. We'll be delighted to have you. But the fact of the matter is, that the democratic systme of caucusing is one which permits us to come out on this floor with greater knowledge of the contents of the legislation that we're going to talk about. With the ability to work out any of the mechanical bugs in legislation and there are many. We all know, that there are many mechanical problems in the drafting of legislation, gives us a final review of all legilsation before it comes out on the floor.

But the issue of not having debate on the floor is simply an option between Senator Barnes and the members of the minority they can either accept or decline. They can debate any bill that they wish. I might also point out that it's my understanding, that the minority does or at least should caucus on the bills which are on the Calendar. We would hope that they do. There are times that some of the questions that have been maised that we can only doubt that they have any working knowledge of the contents of these bills. The fact of the matter

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is. that every Democratic Senator, has a great responsibility in this session. Every Democratic Senator is chairman of a major committee. As a result of this, it's almost impossible for the Democratic Senators not to take time out to handle their committee functions and therefore we have no options but to continue with the existing procedure. And I point out to you, what difference would it make, the members of the news media. the people of this state or to the members of this circle, were we to meet in caucus at 20'clock and convene at 4 o'clock. But obviously, it makes far more sense to open to be in the position to recieve new business and to caucus and then to come out, when we've had the time, to review and analyze the legislation that will be taken up. I don't feel that the caucus requires anydefense. I admire Senator Barnes for his political play of attempting to really convert what is simply bad manners. Something which tdemeansd every member of this legislature into a political plus but I don't think any of us are going to buy it.

SENATOR HULL:

Mr. President, yesterday we celebrated the 405th birthday of William Shakespeare. He said it better than I. I say, to you, et tu, Brute?IfSenator Marcus had made such a politically inspired and unfair rebuke. I wouldn't have been surprised. But, Sir, you and I have been friends, here, and we will continue to be so, despite our differences, ever since I've come

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up here. And you fairness and your wisdom were always evident.

What is it you're afraid of that we've frustrated the minority representing the people have to make this symbolic gesture to say, let's get on with the business, of the State.

How can you, knowing us, knowing your Democratic Senators and I won't name the ones who have talked to me, feel about this disgraceful conduct, rebuke us? Well, I say, Sir, when my political career is done with tripes and badges, I have on my chest, I'll wear proudly the ribbon of rebuke. "o let the record show, that I banged my shoe and my shoelaces on both shoes are loose right now. And let the record show that I was in my chair at 2 o'clock today and any time since the first Wednesday after the first Monday in January.

Mr. President, there's something much deeper here, than may appear on the surface. And that is the danger of one party government, under those who do not believe the people should be represented in a two party system where the Minority stands up and speaks for itself. I do not applogize, Mr. President, excuse me, Senator Marcus, for my manners. I think he has very poor manners. When he has the public wait and he really hit me yesterday, as I sat on the floor, to the very courteous and fair reception I recived from that gentleman, Ly. Governor Frassinelli, when I said that my school children from Danbury asked, when is the Senate going to go into session and I said, I'mvery embarrassed, I don't know.

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Now, the point is, the public is told. If it isn't going to say so downstairs in that little blackboard that our Superintendent puts up, every morning. If it isn't going to say 2 o'clock so the public can come and know what's going on here. Why put it on there? Why not put Marcus time on there? Not daylight saving time or Eastern Standared Time. Whenever the Majority Leader decides we're going to come out and do our little soft shoe for his benefit. Well, we're not going to do it.

Mr. President, the business of the people of this state can be conducted much better but if you want to get down to the real reason, for this. Why couldn't we come her at 11 o'clock in the morning or 10 o'clock and then cancus. And get going during the day sowe can make use of our time. So that the news media can know what time to expect and most importantly, so that the public an have some respect for this body. I'll tell you, sir, that when the history of this general assembly is written, we're going to have much more respect for shoe thumpers than those who have tried to bottle us. BENATOR HULL:

THE CHAIR:

Senator Hull, I just want to say, to you, that I do not feel in the position to answer your comments in relation to me. I will do it at another time, when I'm in my seat on the floor But I want it clearly understood, that I am not reprimanding

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and rebuking anybody. My comments were strictly as I understand the rules of this Senate. It is my understanding that we are to conduct ourselves in this Senate with dignity and decorum. My comments were strictly in realation to the type of procedure that was carried on here in conducting ourselves. That strictly was my remarks and was not a reprimand of any kind, Senator Hull. SENATOR HULL:

Mr. President, would you not agree, as an old friend, whom which you still are obviously, and a gentleman and a great statesman, with your family here. Would you not admit that the decorum of this body would be much enhanced, if we met when we say we're going to meet? SENATOR HULL:

If you permit me to answer it and the body does in my position. I would say that we've been elected to this general assembly. And if we have to be here to conduct our business 24 hours a day, seven days a week, during that periof of five months, it is our job to be heree at the State Capitol and in these chambers. And I feel, sincerely, that we have a tremendous task to accomplish in a very short period of time. And I realize you want to get home to your families, and so do I. But I think we have an obligation here, to carry through the business of the State. Regarless of how long it atakes, how many hours it takes and no matter how much effort we have to

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put into it. If you didn't want to run for political office, if you didn't want to spend all that time here, you shouldn't run. Now, that's my personnal feeling on it and I recognize the next person who wanted to speak, Senator Houley. SENATOR HOULEY:

Mr. President, members of the circle, I am a freshman in this circle but I am shocked, shocked at the lack of decorum in this chamber. I am shocked at the Minority Leader unaudible but again two wrongs have never made a right if in fact there was a wrong to begin with. Now, we'veheard the caucus system, criticized severly, and we've heard this with some reason. Permit me, to question, from a neophyte if you will. to offer an opinion. Not to many months ago, I too, questioned the 12 concepts of government, that I had lived with this I have experienced it and I tell you now, that It's a good system. It's a great system. I've experienced, in my brief tenure, in this chamber, debate that would not be possible on the floor. I've seen devilys advocates, if you will, question every single measure that comes before us. In an effort for better understanding, better sound judgment and I won't go on because, freshmen are not supposed to speak, they are supposed to listen. But I will say this, that I've seen bad taste here today and I'm disappointed.

SENATOR LUPTON:

Mr. President, I would like to refer to the remarks of

April 24, 1969 Page 17 the Minority Leader. Yesterday, we used a totalitarian system to indicate our distaste for this totalitarian type of management we are getting in this session. As you know, sir, I've been here for a good many years. And while Ihave deloyed this arrogance in other years, I have never seen it as bad as it is in this session.

Certainly, we have to have the caucus system. Nobody quarrels with that. But we do not have to caucus in a system that requires a great number of us to sit around at the pleasure of the Majority Leader, hour after hour after hour. If the party wishes and the Majority Leader wishes to caucus, certainly they may caucus. But can't they also schedule? Do we have to come here, as sheep to graze around waiting your pleasure? I think we've been sanctimoniously rebukked, sir, and I resent it and I wish to go on record, publicly and say that what is most important here, is that the public understands how things are being managed. They are not being managed, in my judgement in the public interest. And I hope that this performance sets a two-fold purpose, of alerting them to the issues here, and of awakening their interests, so that the majority arrogance of power may be at least required to do their caucusing at a time when they do not have tie up the rest of us here, who have come to serve them.

SENATOR FAULISO:

Mr. President, I didn't want to participate in this de-

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bate. I felt that it was unnecessary. I think this little specticle abominable. The arguments are inaudible We're attacking each other. This is a disgraceful exhibition. I think we have demeaned this circle. And this circle has a proud history, I am certain. And the reference, et tu Brute, from Shakespeare, certainly is inappropriate, as far as the President Pro Temp is concerned. I think he enjoys a proud record and that record speaks for itself. And that assertion, I'm sure, certainly should not have been made by the distinguished Senator.

I don't know how this thing originated here, but it seems to me, that a point of order may have been a point of disorder. I'm a strong proponent of punctuality. I think there is much room for improvement. We all admit that. I question the means and the tactics which we use here to bring this into focus this into attention. I do believe and I believe this, sincerely, that to adopt the method of that which is purely infantile, to take our shoes off, like the little boys do in the springtime when they run from their school, their homes to demonstrate that spring is really here. To see that display, here, is certainly not right. Gentleman, ladies and gentlemen of this circle deserve more. You're people of intelligence, of high calibre. And you know, to be on the light side, when I saw that exhibition, yesterday, and when he took off his shoe and suddenly senses that there was a bad odor here an abundance

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of it and then when I see the shores here, demonstrated as an exhibit, it reminds me of a case that I tried of an individual who was accused for drunking driving and I thought that I would exhibit the histrionics, which later on I regretted. I had him bring in his extra wooden leg and a lady juror fainted. That cost me the case and I hope it isn't the situation here. I hope that that shoe need not be exhibited as a means of focusing attention that we do need imporovement within our own house.

I think there is another avenue. another way, another means of producing results, satisfactory results. I subscribe to improvement. I believe in it, sincerely. I don't believe that people of the opposite party, because they are in the minority, should wait unduly, for the due process of this legislature to commence. I think you are entitled to the courtesies. I hope that we can before the adjournment of this session, bring about some results. I don't know what the future will bring. But I say to you, that the taxpayers deserve more. And you know, again, to be on the light side, I hope you haven't damaged the desks, so that the taxpayers haven't been prejudiced. So put your weapons away. Let's work together. There's much work to be done. There's good legislation pending. Let's do it together and let this session be a glorious one. Thank you. SENATOR MARCUS:

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Mr. President, I suggest that we walk hand in hand into our respective caucuses and perhaps move that the Senate Stand at ease and the Democratic Senators meet in the Lt. Governor's Office.

Mr. President, I move for adoption of the amendment. A great deal of work went into this particular proposition. However, when in its final stages, we discovered after consulting with several of the agencies, particularly with the Labor Commissioner, there was a substantial numer of minors between the ages of 16 and 21 on the labor market. And to enable

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minors from 14 to 16 to receive summer employment, this would do violence and prejutidice to the other minors who are above the 16 age group. So that we had to work out some type of a plan which would give these minors 14 to 16 an opportunity to work and we restricted it, as the amendment provides to summer work with recreation programs sponsored by town, borough, or political subdivision by the human resources development agency.

We feel that it is a good bill. We feel that it will attract a number of minors in the ages of 14 to 16. I know it doesn't go as far as we had planned originally but we feel that it will reach an appreciable number of minors between the ages of 14 and 16, who wish to take advantage of this program. THE CHARI:

Question is on the adoption? All those in favor indicate by saying, "aye". Opposed? The ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. The amendment is a technical amendment. We will proceed with the bill.

SENATOR FAULISD:

SENATOR SACKSON* PICKETT:

Mr. President, if I may comment on the amendment? Judge Keating died on November, 1967 and at that time, served as Probate Judge for the Distict of Stamford since 1949. Special Act 558 provided for retirement of Probate Judges which became effective in January 1, 1968. If Judge Meating had been living on the effective date of the enactment, he would have been eligible for retirement under Section 45-29f and could have elected a husband and wife income retirement option under the provisions of that section. In that case, his wife would have received the retirement allowance. It seems that Judge Keating's case presents a problem not contemplated by the act providing for retirement of probate Judges. It appears only fair that such retirement allowance should be paid his wife and therefore, I propose an amendment providing that his widow receive the same pension as he would have received, if hehad retired immediably subsequent to the effective date of that section. It appears only fair that Judge Keating's widow should receibe the pension since he had paid so much into the retirement fund and had served so long as Judge of Probate. He had paid his Social Security taxes on a Probate Court income. I want to note for the record that, the payments come the probate retirement fund

I believe in Northern Ireland a minority is being deprived of their freedom and right to vote and I believe it is appropriate that this body recognize this wrong and do everything possible to help right it. I urge the passage.

THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. If not, as many who are in favor signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The bill is passed. THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 572, File No. 569. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on Transportation on <u>Senate Bill No.</u> <u>1201</u>. An Act concerning Cover on Trucks not Having Enclosed Sides and Tops. SENATOR JACKSON:

Mr. President, I move for acceptance of the Joint Committees report and passage of the bill.

THE CHAIR:

Question is on passage of the bill. Will you remark. SENATOR JACKSON:

Mr. President, this bill simply modifies Section 14-271 of the general statutes to require that the truck or vehicle having a load which may blow out or otherwise get on the highway shall be covered. The present law says the vehicle shall be construct-

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ed or loaded in such a matter that it won't escape from the vehicle. I think all of us have driven behind trucks and other vehicles and have had all sorts of debris scattered over our windshield. I move for passage of this bill. THE CHAIR:

Further remarks. If not, as many who are in favor signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The bill is passed. THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 573, File No. 587. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on Banks on Substitute Senate Bill No. 842. An Act concerning Restrictions on Credit Unions. SENATOR HICKEY:

Mr. President, I move for acceptance of the Joint Committee favorable report and passage of the bill. THE CHAIR:

Question is on acceptance of the Joint Committees report and passage of the bill. Will you remark. SENATOR HICKEY:

Mr. President, the bill makes three changes in the powers of credit unions. First, the bill would permit credit unions to make unsecured loans up to the lesser of \$2500 and $2\frac{1}{2}$ percent of its paid in unimpaired capital surplus. Secondly, it would permit members to own an amount of shares in excess of that set by the Board of Directors, but with a maximum of \$15,000. Finally the bill would permit a loan officer to make loans of all types up to that limitation.

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THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. If not, as many who are in favor signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The bill is passed. THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 576, File No. 397. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on Cities and Boroughs on House Bill No. 8340. An Act concerning Water Main Assessments. SENATOR PALMER:

Mr. President, I move for acceptance of the Joint Committee favorable report and passage of the bill. THE CHAIR:

Question is on acceptance of the Joint Committees favorable report and passage of the bill. Will you remark. SENATOR PALMER:

Mr. President, this bill merely permits municipalities to set up special rules pertaining to water main assessments and primarily I think its to properly assess industries that locate inland and perhaps have a 50 foot right-of-way or own a 50 foot tract down a highway. It would permit them to assess at a greater rate than they are paying now. THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. If not, as many who are in favor signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The bill is passed. THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 577, File No. 395. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on Cities and Boroughs on House Bill No.

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8593. An Act concerning Appropriations and Issuance of Bonds for School Construction Projects in the City of Stamford. SENATOR PALMER:

Mr. President, I move for acceptance of the Joint Committee report and passage of the bill.

THE CHAIR:

Question is on acceptance of the Joint Committee favorable report and passage of the bill. Will you remark, Senator. SENATOR PALMER:

Mr. President, this bill would permit the City of Stamford to enter into a school construction contract with the approval of certain officials in the City of Stamford. Which contracts would not extend over a three year period. I am advised by the Assistant Majority Leader that its an excellent bill. THE CHAIR:

Will you remark further. Senator Hickey from the 27th. SENATOR HICKEY:

It is an excellent bill and it should be pointed out that it has been approved by the local legislative body and it is confined to school construction and as pointed out by the Senator from the 18th it is limited to 3 years. THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. If not, as many who are in favor signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The bill is passed. THE CLERK:

The Clerk has received a Raised bill from the House accomp-

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aned by an emergency certification. House Bill No. 8680. An Act concerning the Collection of Taxes in the Town and City of Danbury. THE CHAIR:

Referred to the Committee on Finance. THE CLERK:

Continuing with the Calendar. Calendar No. 579, File No. 412. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on Finance on Substitute House Bill No. 7760. An Act Authorizing the Comptroller to Make Payments of Gasoline Tax Exemption Refunds To the Borough of Naugatuck. SENATOR VERRIKER:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the Committees favorable report and passage of the bill. THE CHAIR:

Question is on acceptance of the Committees favorable report and passage of the bill. Will you remark, Senator? SENATOR VERRIKER:

Mr. President, the purpose of this bill is to allow the Borough of Naugatuck to apply for a refund of the gasoline tax for the years 1964, 1965 and from January to June of 1966. The Joint Finance Committee feels the bill ought to pass. THE CHAIR:

Further remarks. If not, as many who are in favor signify by saying aye, opposed. The bill is passed.

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THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 581, File No. 401. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on General Law on House Bill No. 5654. An Act concerning Safety Devices and Equipment on Vessels. THE CHAIR:

Senator Jackson of the 5th District.

Mr. President, I move for acceptance of the Joint Committee favorable report and passage of the bill. THE CHAIR:

Question is on the acceptance of the Joint Committees favorable report and passage of the bill. Will you remark, Senator? SENATOR JACKSON:

Mr. President, this simply amends Section 15-129 of the general statutes and requires that no person shall operate or give permission to operate of a vessel which is not equiped as required by the section I just mentioned, which is the Boating Safety Act that we passed during the last session. This is the requirement that you have to have an adequate number of life preservers, fire extinguishers. I urge the passage of this bill. THE CHAIR:

Further remarks. If not, as many who are in favor signify by saying aye, opposed. The bill is passed. THE CLERK: HB 5657 Calendar No. 582, File No. 399. Favorable report of the

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Joint Standing Committee on General Law on House Bill No. 5657. An Act concerning Rules for Motorboat Operators. As amended by House Amendment Schedule "A".

SENATOR JACKSON:

Mr. President, I move for acceptance of the Joint Committee favorable report and passage of the bill. THE CHAIR:

Question is on acceptance of the Joint Committees report and passage of the bill. Will you remark, Senator. SENATOR JACKSON:

Mr. President, this another one of the good boating bills. It spells out in detail what is meant by excessive speed by an operator of a motorboat. It says that you have to take into consideration in the same manner as the Motor Vehicle Statute, the conditions and circumstances such as the closeness of the shore, shore facilities, other vessels, either in operation or moored, the width of the channel and I believe again anyone who has had the misfortunate to be swamped by a boat being driven in excessive speed will realize that this is a very important bill and I move its passage.

THE CHAIR:

Further remarks. If not, all those in favor of House Bill No 5657 as amended by House Amendment Schedule A, signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The bill is passed as amended. THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 583, File No. 408. Favorable report of the

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Joint Standing Committee on General Law on Modified House Bill No. 5896. An Act Requiring Nurses to Follow Direction of Dentist as Well as Physician. SENATOR JACKSON:

Mr. President, I move for acceptance of the Joint Favorable report of the Committee and passage of the bill. THE CHAIR:

Question is on passage of the bill. Will you remark. SENATOR JACKSON:

Mr. President, this bill simply will require that nurses follow the direction of Dentists in their prescribed field of training and knowledge and I urge its passage.

THE CHAIR: technical mondment. They don't print it in the House,

Further remarks. All in favor signify by saying aye, contrary mined. The bill is passed.

THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 584, File No. 378. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on General Law on House Bill No. 7155. An Act concerning Leif Erikson Day. As amended by House Amendment Schedule "A".

SENATOR JACKSON:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the Joint Committees favorable report and passage of the bill. THE CHAIR:

Question is on acceptance of the Joint Committees favorable report and passage of the bill. Will you remark Senator.

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Mr. President, this will just amend Section 10-30 of the general statutes by adding subsection j, which will give the Governor the right to proclaim any of the first nine days of October as Leif Erikson Day. I believe there was a amendment in the House, Boes this have to be acted on Mr. President? THE CHAIR:

The bill is amended at present. We are taking up the bill as amended. SENATOR JACKSON:

I don't believe that the bill in our file is amended. THE CHAIR:

Its a technical amendment. They don't print it in the House. SENATOR JACKSON:

Will you read the Amendment please. THE CLERK:

Strike out line 3 and insert in lieu thereof the following: Shall proclaim a day within the first nine days of October of each year to be Leif Erikson Day. SENATOR JACKSON:

I will move for passage of the bill as amended in the House. THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. Senator Fauliso from the 1st District. SENATOR FAULISO:

Mr. President, for a time I was a little bit concerned about the confusing about Leif Erikson but I am convinced that

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language here does not indicate that he discovered America, lest there be any misunderstanding. I recall the distinguished jurist that passed away a short while ago, who left Pennsylvania at the time he was serving as a Justice of that Court and came here to correct some mis-representation that were made at that time and I think that once and for all, I trust, that the question of the discovery of America belongs to the great discover Christopher Columbus. While I urge the passage of this bill to set aside this Leif Erikson Day, it pays tribute to the fact that he was a great navigator also. The only fear I had also that it might be in close proximity to that of October 12th. but the day seems to be sufficiently distant so that there cannot be any confusion on this event.

THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. Senator Dinielli from the 31st District SENATOR DINIELLI:

Mr. President, I represent the Towns of Bristol and Southington and the Sons of Italy Lodges in both towns have asked me to let the circle know, that they have no objections of this bill. That there is nothing but love and peace in their heart and they hope that the minority represented by this bill would be happy at its passage. I agree with the Senator from the 1st that there is no mention of any discovery here. We feel that it is a perfectly good bill and should pass. THE CHAIR:

Further remarks. Senator DiRienzo from the 10th.

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SENATOR DIRIENZO:

Mr. President, I have been instructed to go along also with this bill as long as it doesn't conflict with our Columbus Day Parade in the City of New Haven.

THE CHAIR:

Senator Eddy from the 9th District. SENATOR EDDY:

Mr. President, I wonder if this isn't a 'camel nose in the tent' bill. This year its Leif Erikson Day and next session it will be the discovery of America. I wonder if you haven't worried about that a little bit.

Senator Fauliso from the 1st. District. SENATOR FAULISO:

Mr. President, I'm sure that there are gentlemen of this circle that have latitude to make true patrietic speeches. One on Leif Erikson Day and one on Columbus Day and I think that might take care of the situation but it may well be that a bill similar to what the distinguished Senator has just suggested, could very well be established and become part of the law of the state. I don't think that's necessary though. I think that we all can see from history and from, and we accept history as factual and history is the truth. I think that the historians have recorded this as a fact and there is no question about it although, there maybe people from time to time who wish to change this great historical fact that no matter how hard they try

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we of the Italian extriction we feel that there is certain nobility about this event and will always come to the protection and the defense of the great discoverer. THE CHAIR:

Senator Hull from the 24th District. SENATOR HULL:

Mr. President, I think we ought to leave the matter where it is. THE CHAIR:

Senator Burke from the 3rd District. SENATOR BURKE:

Mr. President, I'm very sorry, I was out of the chamber. I didn't hear the amendment and I didn't know who Erickson was, However, I was just thinking if there is anything in this amendment Mr. President, that took care of Edwin Burke, my great grandfather. THE CHAIR:

They just ran the bell on that one. Senator Fauliso. SENATOR FAULISO:

(Senator Fauliso's remarks inaudible) THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. Senator Jackson. SENATOR JACKSON:

Mr. President, I would just like to impress upon every member of this circle, particular those of Italian extriction and heritage that the General Law Committee certainly did not wish

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to cast any doubt as to Christopher Columbus and the great works that he has accomplished. I would remind everyone that we have just passed simply a bill which will now perpetuate Columbus Day as a three day holiday, one of the four that we have made possible to also conform with federal regulations. In passing this bill this is not a legal holiday, it is simply a recognition of Leif Erikson who was a great navigator and a great man and also to commemorate the fine contribution to both the United States and the State of Connecticut. This is the only light which we have proposed this bill and certainly we do not want to cause any problems with our good brothers of Italian ancestry. THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. Senator Rudolph from the 28th District SENATOR RUDOLPH:

Mr. President, I sense a protective covering or shield around the great discoverer of America by many of my colleagues on the Senate floor. But I want to endorse this bill because I know that somewhere along the line, Leif Erikson must have been a fine Jewish boy. THE CHAIR:

Will you remark further. If not, all who are in favor signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The bill is passed. THE CLERK:

Calendar No. 585, File No. 383. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on Public Utilities on Modified House Bill No. 5685. An Act concerning the Exercise of Refuse Disposal

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and other functions by the Metropolitan District.

SENATOR STANLEY:

Mr. President, I move for acceptance of the Joint Committee favorable report and passage of the bill.

THE CHAIR:

Question is on acceptance of the Joint Committees favorable report and passage of the bill. Will you remark? SENATOR STANELY:

Mr. President, this bill again is a houskeeping measure as it addresses itself to Metropolitan District. They have now the ability to pickup and dispose of refuse, however, the mechanics of how it is to be done upon agreement between municipilaties would be worked out and hasn't heretofore been spelt out. Its a good bill we urge its passage. THE CHAIR:

Further remarks. If not as many who are in favor signify by saying aye, opposed. The bill is passed. THE CLERK:

Turn to page 27 please under heading Matter returned from the Legislative Commissioner. Calendar No. 222, File No. 647, Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on Banks on House Bill No. 5790. An Act concerning Exemption of Farmers' Cooperative Marketing Corporations from Registration Under the Connecticut Securities Act. As amended by Senate Amendments Schedule A and B.

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SENATOR HICKEY:

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the Committees favorable report and passage of the bill as amended.

THE CHAIR:

Question is on passage of this bill as amended. Will you remark.

SENATOR HICKEY:

Mr. President, as amended the bill now provides that the Farmers' Cooperative Marketing Corporations as well as Consumer Cooperatives exempt from registration under the Connecticut Securities Act.

THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks. If not, all those in favor of this bill as amended, signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The bill is passed.

THE CLERK:

Under the heading Disagreeing Action. Calendar No. 316, File No. 588. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on Human Rights and Opportunities on Substitute Senate Bill No. 157 An Act concerning Pre-Sentence Inquiry into the Accuracy of a Prior Criminal Record, as amended by House Amendment Schedule A. SENATOR FAULISO.

Mr. President, I move acceptance of the Committees favorable report and passage of the bill as amended. THE CHAIR:

Question is on passage of this bill as amended. Will you

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SENATOR FAULISO:

Mr. President, the amendment makes provisions for motions to be addressed to the accuracy of any part of the record or report. I urge passage.

THE CHAIR:

Further remarks. If not, as many who are in favor of this bill as amended signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The bill is passed, as amended.

THE CLERK:

On page 29 from the foot of the Calendar. Calendar No. 275, File No. 185. Favorable report of the Joint Standing Committee on Corrections on <u>Substitute House Bill No. 6443</u>. An Act concerning Assault by A Correctional Institution Inmate or Parolee as amended by House Amendment Schedule A. SENATOR BARLOW:

Mr. President, I move for acceptance of the Joint Committee favorable report and passage of the bill, as amended by the House. THE CHAIR:

Question is on passage of this bill as amended by House Amendment Schedule A. Will you remark Senator. SENATOR BARLOW:

Mr. President and members of the circle, this is a bill to make provision that any inmate in a correctional institution who assaults a correctional guard or parele officer, is subject to a penalty up to 5 years. This bill was spoken for by the Commiss-

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ioner of Corrections. THE CHAIR:

Any further remarks on the bill as amended. If not, as many who are in favor of this bill as amended signify by saying aye contrary minded. The bill is passed as amended. THE CLERK:

Clerk has a Senate Joint Resolution. Senate Joint Resolution No. 109. Resolution Creating a Special Commission to Consider the Role of the Tri-State Transportation Commission. SENATOR HICKEY:

Mr. President, I move for suspension of the rules for immediate consideration of the resolution. THE CHAIR:

If there are no objections the rules will be suspended. You may take up the resolution. SENATOR HICKEY:

Will the Clerk please read the resolution. THE CLERK:

Resolved by this Assembly:

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WHEREAS, pursuant to the Connecticut General Statues, the Laws of New Jersey and the Laws of New York, providing for an interstate compact betwwen the State of Connecticut, New Jersey and New York creating the Tri-State Transportation Commission, and prescribing the functions, powers and duties thereof, for the purpose of continuing the regional transportation and related land use studies commenced by the Tri-State Transportation

Page 47 April 30, 1969 Committee as the official regional planning agency for the Tri-State Region, expired on March 1, 1969; and

WHEREAS, the three states of Connecticut, New Jersey and New York have agreed to pass concurrent legislation extending the Tri-State Compact until July 1, 1971; and

WHEREAS, it is the intention and design of the party states that the work carried out by the commission be continued as it is essential for continuous, coordinated and comprehensive planning in the Tri-State Region to be carried out to assure the continued qualification of the States of Connecticut, New Jersey and New York for federal funds from the United States Department of Transportation, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development and other federal departments; and

WHEREAS, some questions have been raised by the federal departments as to the goals, work program and organization of the Tri-State Transportation Commission in meeting requirements for federal planning assistance; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable that a thorough review be made of the existing legislation in the light of the federal requirements and the intent and design of the party states;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the legislatures of the States of Connecticut, New Jersey and New York, at the request of their Governors and with understanding that similar resolutions will be adopted by each state, do hereby create a special bi-partisan commission, to be known as the interim executive-legislative study commission to consider the role of the

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Tri-State Transportation Commission as follows:

1. The Connecticut members of the study commission shall consist of twelve members to be appointed as follows: Four members by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; four members by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate; four members by the Governor, at least one of which will be from appointments to the Tri-State Transportation Commission.

2. It shall be the duty of the study commission to review and study, by means of research and investigation, Tri-State's history, concept, existing federal requirements for continuous, coordinated and comprehensive regional planning, and the future rele of the Tri-State Transportation Commission, and to obtain all the facts possible in relation thereto which would not only be of public interest but which would aid the legislatures in the States of Connecticut, New Jersey and New York to enact remedial legislation;

3. The study commission shall utilize the present staff and facilities of the Tri-State Transportation Commission, including authorized travel expenses in connection with the study commission's work, which shall be paid out the appropriations from the three states for Tri-State;

4. The study commission shall elect a Chairman and two Vice-Chairmen from its members, with each of the three states being represented;

5. The study commission or any duly authorized subcommittee thereof is authorized to sit and act at such places and times

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during the study period as may be required. A majority of the members of the commission or any subcommittee thereof shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

6. The study commission shall make a full report, together with its findings, to the Governors and to the respective legislatures of the three states at the earliest practicable date, but no later than January 1, 1971.

7. The members of the study commission shall receive no compensation but shall have their expenses paid; and

8. The study commission shall cease to exist thirty days after the transmission of such report to the Governors.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution shall take effect immediately upon passage of substantially concurrent resolutions by the State of Connecticut, New Jersey and New York. SENATOR HICKEY:

Mr. President, I move adoption of the resolution. THE CHAIR:

Question is on adoption of the resolution. Will you remark. SENATOR HICKEY:

Mr. President, I believe the resolution is self-explanatory, the Tri-State performed a valuable service over the pass few years with respect to transportation problems in the Metropolitan area. This would simply set up a state program to try, if possible, to improve the functions of Tri-State in the future. I think its a good resolution and I urge its adoption.

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Any further remarks on this resolution. If not, as many who are in favor signify by saying aye, contrary minded. The resolution is adopted.

THE CLERK:

The Clerk would remark to clear up some confusion. The House has not been causing to be printed in the files technical amendments. But to clear up the confusion the Clerk of the Senate has ordered this from this week forward. So any technical amendment, whether it be House or Senate will be printed in the files. These bills were in the files and I did not want to pull them out. No further business on the Clerk's desk.

THE CHAIR:

Senator Hickey from the 27th District. SENATOR HICKEY:
