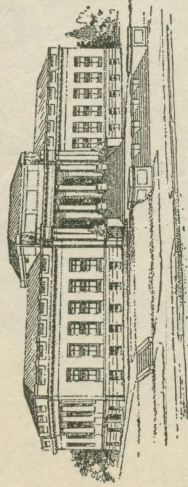

In or betwixt in the County of West and  
Province of New York In America

Yours of the 1 of February 1707 we  
have with great Joy Received whereby we understand  
You that we are the Sons of your naturall Sister -  
Anne Tye daughter of Francis Tye & Lettis Salmon  
his wife Who with our father Daniel Brodhead was  
married as you write and in the Year 1664 in May  
Left England and Came for these parts and when here  
Lived together till July 14<sup>th</sup> 1667. Then our father  
departed this life and Left our Mother three Sons behind  
him (to wit) Dapple & Charles Both borne in England &  
Richard borne in this County and after ~~some~~ <sup>some</sup> yeares Widdow  
hood married one William Nottingham <sup>in the year 1700</sup> who came over in the  
June 11<sup>th</sup> last our Father & Mother did who lived with her  
till the Year 1690 or departed this life June 5<sup>th</sup> and left  
her three Children behind him: Elizabeth: William &  
John And in the Year 1691 - our Mother married  
one Thomas Gorton with whom she now liveth &  
hath one daughter Anne Our Mother Daniel departed  
this life June 24<sup>th</sup> 1690. ~~then~~ <sup>she</sup> married of our brother Wm  
& John & Elizabeth Nottingham our brother W<sup>m</sup> Nottingham  
will give you a particular ~~Account~~ <sup>Account</sup> of her & her  
We shold have been glad to be informed where our Uncle John  
Liveth in England <sup>that we might write to him</sup> & how long he married one  
Thomas Quinell and Left these parts about seven  
and twenty yeares ago & went for England and as we

bed & left behind her a daughter <sup>we</sup> since that time

and hath been strong till about a yeare and a  
halfe ago she is growne Crasie & Crept) we all  
that are alive) Thanks be to the great god of  
heaven and Earth have wherewithall to Live  
Comfortable of most gained by the Industry of  
our Old Mother. Wee most Honored Uncle and Aunt  
with our wives and Children Remember our  
Obedient and humble Respects to you and yours  
hoping that these may in health & prospering  
find you all & hope that we may  
have a further Correspondance by this way  
as well from you as our Uncle John by your  
Corrections: Which would be very Acceptable to  
them that wishes you and yours all health wealth  
and happynesse And takes leave to subscribe themselves
