The Rev. William Cooper Mead, D. D., L. L. D. IN MEMORIAM.

At the request of the senior editor of the Norwalk Gazette, and in obedience to his heart's prompting, I, who is not a member of the Protestant Episcopal Church, nor of the Masonic Order, but a fellow citizen and neighbor of the late Dr. Mead, and who was honored by his highly-prized friendship, ventures to drop his "sprig of evergreen" upon his tomb and offer a small contribution to the "grand honor" which his "children of the mystic" rendered as his grave.

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Rev. Dr. Mead's Will.

I, William Cooper Mead, rector of St. Paul's Church, Norwalk, Connecticut, for more than forty years last past, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, do make, ordain and publish this, my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following, that is to say:

J., the sum of Five Thousand Dollars; also the portraits of my father and mother now hanging in my southwest parlor; also, the set of silverware now in my southwest parlor, being the set presented to me by the heirs of the late James Moody Hoy, who died at Norwalk in the year of our Lord, 1854.

Fourth.—I give and bequeath to my daughter, MRS. CORNELIA JANE MEAD, widow of Theodore H. Mead, of Groton, Connecticut, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars.

Fifth.—I give and bequeath to my grand-daughter, ISABELLA TIFFANY, eldest daughter of Samuel L. and Isabella E. Tiffany, the sum of One Thousand Dollars.

Sixth.—I give and bequeath to my grand-daughter, MRS. ELIZABETH X. MEAD, widow of Theodore H. Mead, of Groton, Connecticut, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars.

Seventh.—I give and bequeath to my grand-daughter, MRS. LOUISE TIFFANY, widow of S. Stuart, merchant in the city of New York the sum of Five Hundred Dollars.

Eighth.—I give and bequeath to my grand-daughter, MRS. ELIZABETH X. MEAD, widow of Theodore H. Mead, of Groton, Connecticut, the sum of Five Hundred Dollars.
